

This is a Hybrid Course: There are ten designated face-to-face meetings on Saturday Mornings.

Course Syllabus: Hybrid English 100 Section 6829

SRJC Course Description: 4 units/4 hours lecture. Grade Only. Prerequisite: Completion of ENGL 302 or higher (V8) OR Course Completion of ENGL 306 OR Qualifying Test Score in English. This reading and writing course is designed to develop skills to the level required for success in ENGL 1A and other transfer-level courses.

Student Learning Outcome

1. Analyze readings of various lengths and complexity in terms of rhetorical method of development, style, implications, irony, satire, assumptions and biases.
2. Summarize and synthesize ideas from more than one college-level reading.
3. Compose logically developed and organized analytical and argumentative essays with clear point of view and thesis.
4. Revise, edit, and proofread essays and other writing with particular attention to syntax, sentence structure, grammar, punctuation, and formatting.
5. Read, analyze, and evaluate research source materials and document them in written assignments in MLA style.

Attendance/Dropping the Class

Beginning on January 17th there are three "check-ins" to be completed by the first face-to-face meeting on January 21st in Emeritus Hall room 1628 at 8 am, which you are expected to attend. If you fail to complete the check-in process (all three) by 1/21 and/or you do not attend the first face-to-face class, you will be dropped from the class.

If you have two (2) consecutive absences from face-to-face class meetings during the first 8 weeks of the course, you will be dropped from the class. In addition, if you collectively miss three (3) or more face-to-face class meetings during the entire course, or you do not take the midterm and/or the final exam you will not receive a passing grade.
