2. Compare and contrast various periods of historic dress regarding use of silhouette, color, fabric, role of women and men and, finally, as a means for class distinction.

4. Analyze present-day fashions in terms of how they draw from historic ideas.

2. Historic dress as it relates to men's and women's roles and class distinction
  3. Impact of dress on individual's lives with respect to success, happiness, status, comfort, and freedom
  4. Fashion trends today and their historic influences
