- 2. Analyze proper application of various bits.
- 3. Identify and practice skills needed in fundamental riding maneuvers.
- 4. Demonstrate proper control of horse movement.
- 5. Develop correct body position with the horse to work on refining and controlling movements.
- 6. Develop skill in recognizing timing and correction to complete each maneuver.

- 5. Exacting circle and straight line riding.
- 6. Correct pattern and schooling figures work with smooth transitions.
