COURSE CONTENT

Student Learning Outcomes:

At the conclusion of this course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Initiate, maintain, and comprehend simple conversations in Japanese on everyday topics using statements and questions in the present tenses.
- 2. Write coherent paragraphs containing descriptions of people, places, and everyday activities.
- 3. Read level appropriate material written in traditional Japanese.
- 4. Utilize Japanese in linguistically and culturally appropriate ways at the beginning level.
- 5. Demonstrate cultural awareness and insights about the Japanese-speaking world as well as the Japanese-speaking communities in the United States.

Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Utilize common Japanese vocabulary related to everyday topics.
- 2. Read simplified passages from original Japanese texts for general meaning and basic comprehension.
- 3. Communicate in traditional spoken and written Japanese.
- 4. Employ greetings and polite expressions in a culturally appropriate context and manner.
- 5. Organize short sentences and paragraphs in Japanese.
- 6. Demostrate insight into Japanese culture, traditions and society.
- 7. Correctly express thoughts in written form utilizing appropriate traditional Japanese Kanji characters.
- 8. Pronounce the phonetic symbols in Japanese romaji, kana, and kanji.

Topics and Scope:

Content and topics will reflect beginning communicative skills required to function in crosscultural, academic, social and job-related situations.

 - B. Familiarity with at least 100 kanji/Chinese characters

 - B. Location words
 - C. Elements of telling time

 - H. Days of the week; months of the year
 - I. Pastimes, sports, and places
- III. Conversation
 - A. Provide self-identification including personal information, nationalities, and occupations
 - B. Describe family members and their relationships

 - D. Accept and reject an invitation
 - E. Have discussions using days of the week, months of the year, and words related to seasons and weather
 - F. Discuss pastimes, sports, and places
 - G. Describe clothing and shopping; colors
 - H. Telling and asking time
 - I. Converse about locations of people, places, and things
 - J. Modify statements with quantity expressions
 - K. Describe activities and events in the present, past, and present progressive tenses

Written homework, dictation and translation, short compositions

Problem Solving: Assessment tools, other than exams, that demonstrate competence in computational or non-computational problem solving skills.

Workbook exercises, group activities, projects

Skill Demonstrations: All skill-based and physical demonstrations used for assessment purposes including skill performance exams.

Class dictation and translation activities, in-class oral participation

Exams: All forms of formal testing, other than skill performance exams.

Quizzes, chapter exams and final: Multiple choice, true/false, matching items, completion

Other: Includes any assessment tools that do not logically fit into the above categories.

Writing 20 - 30%

Problem solving 10 - 20%

Skill Demonstrations 20 - 30%

Exams 30 - 40% Completion of computer-based exercises, interpreting videos
