COURSE CONTENT

Outcomes and Objectives:

The students will:

- 1. Analyze themselves as communicators in group situations, including recognition of personal biases and prejudices.
- 2. Evaluate others in the group situations.
- 3. Be able to observe and evaluate group communication.
- 4. Use, describe and analyze active listening skills.
- 5. Evaluate leadership styles.
- 6. Identify the common elements in a group situation, including norms, sex roles, and conflict resolution strategies.
- 7. Develop an appreciation of the differences of others.
- 8. Evaluate self and others' ability to negotiate for change.
- 9. Discuss multicultural awareness and appreciation of diversity.
- 10. Discuss gender issues.

- 1. Group dynamics vocabulary.
- 2. Active listening.
- 3. Sex roles.
- 4. Group norms.
- 5. Status and power.
- 6. Conflict resolution.
- 7. Decision making styles.
- 8. Coalitions and sub-groups.
- 9. Hidden agendas.
- 10. Environment and seating.

- 11. Developmental stages in groups.
- 12. Reflective thinking skills.
- 13. Consensus/groupthink.
- 14. Leadership styles.
- 15. Nonverbal communication.
- 16. Multicultural and cross cultural sensitivity as it applies to the above list.

Assignment:

Assignments usually include:

- 1. Experiential games and simulation exercises.
- 2. Participation in various types of small groups.
- 3. Field work (field experiment, mock trial).
- 4. Written midterm (includes reading and textbook). Critical thinking skills exercised as students apply themselves to the midterm's general concepts. Questions refer to leadership, interpersonal orientation, conflict resolution, gender issues and non-verbal communication.
- 5. Comprehensive Term Paper (indicating ability to apply, analyze, evaluate and synthesize concepts of group dynamics and problem solving), to a specific group of the student's choice.

Methods of Evaluation/Basis of Grade:

Writing: Assessment tools that demonstrate writing skills and/or require students to select, organize and explain ideas in writing.

Reading reports, Essay exams, Term papers

Writing 30 - 65%

Problem Solving: Assessment tools, other than exams, that demonstrate competence in computational or non-computational problem solving skills.

Homework problems, Exams

Problem solving 10 - 25%

Skill Demonstrations: All skill-based and physical demonstrations used for assessment purposes including skill performance exams.
