- 4. Design a casket cover for an open and one for a closed casket.
- 5. Attend field trip to mortuary and cemetery. Written field notes: 2-3 pages per visit.
- 6. Portfolio: assemble photos of design projects with accompanying journal entries listing materials and describing methods for each project.
- 7. Final exam.
- 8. Final project: Design, construct, and set up a complete funeral display.
- 9. Reading, 5 10 pages per week.
- 10. Repeating students are expected to improve skill, enhance designs, and produce projects with increased speed.

#### Methods of Evaluation/Basis of Grade:

**Writing:** Assessment tools that demonstrate writing skills and/or require students to select, organize and explain ideas in writing.
