- 4. Memorize leader's calls to dances or native vocabulary for dance steps
- 5. Participate in local folk dance events or festivals as approved by instructor; or a written critique of a dance piece or performance (based on a performance from the current semester, or for video viewing option, instructor will provide or approve a video). (2 3 pages)

- 3. Note-taking
- 4. Practice sessions
- 5. Final exam

Optional assignments:
