- 2. In no case will a student be allowed to undertake a topic that duplicates another regular offering.
- 3. Topics related to Humanities may include arts, music, film, video, architecture, dance, literature, poetry, cultural criticism.

Assignment:

Assignments for Humanities will vary with student and the topic.

- 1. Must include research or reading.
- 2. Must include written essay or term papers.
- 3. Optional creative project and/or oral presentation.

Methods of Evaluation/Basis of Grade:

Writing: Assessment tools that demonstrate writing skills and/or require students to select, organize and explain ideas in writing.
