1. Describe counseling practices relevant to various crisis situations.
2. Apply an appropriate crisis intervention model to a counseling situation.
3. Analyze appropriate intervention methods for clients involved in self-inflicted harm or suicide, domestic violence and childhood abuse, taking into consideration the impact of coexisting mental health problems.

### **Objectives:**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Identify and analyze the various steps used in crisis counseling.
2. Describe the elements needed in counseling individuals experiencing different types of crisis.
3. Discuss and evaluate the "miracle question" as a counseling technique.
4. Define and discuss the "cognitive keys" that underlie the crisis.
5. Demonstrate how to use observations and client responses.
6. Identify and analyze ethical and professional issues.
7. Describe and utilize referrals as appropriate for crisis intervention.
8. Identify the role of culture and its impact on the crisis counseling session.
