- 2. Recognize and interpret the spatial distribution of Earth's physical and cultural features using maps and other geographical tools.
- 3. Analyze world events and contemporary issues using geographical methods and tools, and explain how globalization shapes the modern world.

Objectives:

- 2. Use, analyze and interpret maps.
- 3. Demonstrate awareness and knowledge of regions with respect to their unique cultural,

- political, economic, social, historical and physical geographical patterns.
- 4. Define and describe major geographic concepts and use them to recognize the distribution of cultural and physical features on Earth's surface.
- 5. Utilize geographic concepts and terms to explain consequences of globalization.
- 6. Explain the underlying social and physical geographic forces shaping global events.
- 7. Identify and explain the impacts of human-caused environmental problems on world populations.
