- 5. Demonstrate emergence of accurate Italian phonetics and pronunciation.
- 6. Identify and practice new vocabulary from context.
- 7. Locate main ideas and key words in familiar spoken statements.
- 8. Scan simple, printed text for specific information and main ideas.

- 9. Discern differences between formal and informal contexts, and express appropriate courtesy.
- 10. Formulate statements in the present tense that describe self, common actions and preferences, future plans, daily activities, family, and surroundings.
