4. Demonstrate understanding and correct use of verb tenses to express opinions and emotions about topics raised in class discussions.
5. Identify the main ideas expressed in Spanish spoken by native speakers.
6. Communicate with sufficient clarity so as to be understood by native speakers.
7. Demonstrate control of accurate Spanish phonetics and pronunciation.
8. Comprehend and utilize new vocabulary from context.
9. Comprehend specific information and main ideas in simple printed texts.
