COURSE CONTENT

Outcomes and Objectives:

- 1. Describe the range of stress responses and identify those that are dysfunctional as well as explain several treatment approaches effective in relieving stress reactions.
- 2. Discuss how thoughts, feelings and behaviors affect our well being and cite research studies to support such discussions.
- 3. Explain why personality disorders are particularly difficult to diagnose and identify several forms of personality disorder, including the narcissistic, antisocial, borderline, and obsessive-compulsive disorders.
- 4. Explain the effects of substance abuse on both the individual and society and examine the causal factors contributing to such abuse.
- 5. Explain the categories used by the DSM to distinguish between the mood disorders and the schizophrenias.
- 6. Identify the mental disorders that result from organic causes such as physical trauma, disease, and exposure to toxic substances.
- 7. Distinguish between childhood and adult disorders and recognize the characteristics of several such disorders, including autism, the attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder, and the conduct disorder.
- 8. Characterize several therapy approaches and point out when and where they are most effective.
- 9. Record lecture material and relate that material to assigned readings.
- 10. Demonstrate critical, independent thinking and analytical skills in a variety of examinations.
