Outcomes and Objectives:

- 2. Demonstrate intermediate or higher level technique skills in performance.
- 3. Display performance skills such as projection and dynamics.
- 4. Apply principles of composition to dance pieces.
- 5. Perform in a wide variety of settings on various types of stages, both traditional and informal.
- 6. Evaluate and critique performances in terms of:
 - a. Individual growth as a dancer and performer.
 - b. Aesthetics of the choreography and the performance as a whole in relation to the show's theme.
 - c. Meeting of audience educational objectives.

- 7. Two page post-production critique or opinion paper analyzing the aesthetic success of the performance and the learning experience gained from the entire process
