Course description: **ESL 372** is a high-intermediate reading, writing, and grammar course focusing on the development of academic reading skills and the basic essay writing process. After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

1. Apply critical thinking skills to respond to un-adapted selections of fiction and nonfiction

2. Apply the writing process to produce essays that demonstrate level-appropriate organization and content, critical thinking, vocabulary and fluency, and grammatical accuracy

 Comprehend high-intermediate reading passages by identifying organizational strategies, paraphrasing and summarizing, and using main ideas and details to support writing assignments
Word-process essays and access information on the Internet and library databases to support their

writing

5. Utilize metacognitive thinking skills in learning and studying processes

We will have several tests on the material we cover in class. There will be an in-class writing midterm and an in-class writing final exam. You must be present on the day the tests are given. If you are unable to take a test on the day it is given - due to a significant cause – it is your responsibility to arrange a make-up test with your instructor. Allowing a make-up test is at the discretion of your instructor.

Grading

Your final grade (based on percentages, not points) will reflect how well you complete the following categories:

- Written homework assignments (i.e., paragraphs, essays, journals, analysis of readings, etc.) 40%
- Problem solving assignments (i.e., essay revision, vocabulary, grammar, punctuation exercises, reading comprehension activities, etc.) 30%
- Exams (i.e., grammar, vocabulary, unit quizzes; in-class writing exams for midterm and final) 30%

This is a letter grade class. Grades will be based on the following percentage total you have earned at the end of the semester.

- A grade = 90-100%
- B grade = 80-89%
- C grade = 70-79%

- D grade = 60-69%
- F grade = 59% and below
