Catalogue Description

The course covers the scientific study of human behavior; emotions, thinking, heredity, environment, learning, intelligence, and human diversity.

Course Summary

Psychology is an exciting field that opens the door to a rich and deep understanding of people and relationships. Learning various psychological perspectives allows us to understand ourselves and others better. This class will be an opportunity for you to learn various psychological theories, explore different approaches to understanding human behavior and apply that information to your own life experience.

- Be familiar with the major theories, concepts and perspectives in psychology.
- Apply psychological theories, concepts and principles to individual experience as well as to broader social issues and social systems.
- Use psychological knowledge to reflect on personal experience.
- Use psychological knowledge to recognize and understand the complexity of cultural diversity.
- Understand and apply basic research methods in psychology and other social sciences.
- Demonstrate skills that promote behavioral change in individuals, groups and larger systems.

This is the most updated version of the book. While I recommend you use the most recent version, the 10th edition may be a viable option. However, please pay attention to the order of the chapters in the modules as they are not always in chronological order.

Another option is to purchase (or rent) an eBook or Kindle edition that gives you access to the book online If you choose to purchase the eBook, you will not have a hard copy of the book to use. The eBook can be purchased on line at places like Amazon.

This course utilizes CANVAS. You must have regular access to a computer to take this course. Make sure your computer software is relatively current. If you are having problems, try accessing the computers available to students on campus.

You are encouraged to annotate your text. Annotating your textbook is an important way to assist you in your learning. Annotation allows you to note important concepts, make connections and relate new concepts to existing ideas and concepts you have already learned.
