Course Description

This course is designed to examine how social forces affect human behavior, an exploration of American society from several levels of analysis including face-to-face social interaction, groups, and institutions. (UC, CSU)

<u>Disclaimer:</u> The sociological topics/phenomena covered, discussed, and researched in this course may involve controversial material necessary to understand a greater depth in the topics discussed. Nevertheless, sensitivity to others during classroom discussions will be strictly maintained in this course.

Instructions:

**NOTE: Student MUST FIRST complete both short, individual topic papers in order to participate in group presentation and earn points – NO EXCEPTIONS!
