#### **Course Description**

*From the Catalog*: A survey of international film history from the 1950s to the present with emphasis on the New Waves and the New Hollywood. The course will also cover the historical evolution of the narrative form, as well as development of formal devices such as shot, mise-en-scene, editing, and sound design.

From the Instructor: As one of the few art forms that nearly all of us have direct experience with on a near daily basis, it seems natural for an educated person to acquire some understanding of the history of film. Understanding film history requires a study of technology, culture, the development of film as an art form, an appreciation of where film fits in the scope of social history, the evolution of film as an economic force and how films and film analysis from a given country can influence the development of the whole of film art.

#### **Learning Objectives**

The student will:

- 1. Demonstrate a working knowledge of American and international film history from the 1950s to the present.
- 2. Recognize and distinguish films according to the period in which they were produced.
- 3. Examine the evolving art of the motion picture in social, cultural, artistic, technological, and economic contexts.
- 4. Evaluate the contributions of significant historical movements and filmmakers in shaping the history of motion pictures.
- 5. Relate the transformation of film technology to the evolution of film form, with particular attention to narrative and aesthetic developments.

Through essays on films and film topics, the writing assignments will demonstrate the students' understanding of the lectures and discussions. The exams will ask the student to demonstrate knowledge of terms and topics via multiple choice, and true/false. Participation will be a demonstration of the student's willingness to share knowledge of the topics with his/her fellow students as well as a willingness to actively listen to other students' perspectives and engage one another in active discussion.

Santa Rosa Junior College has a pretty clear policy on attendance: "...a student is expected to attend all sessions of each class in which he/she is enrolled." It should also be noted that my lectures come from my notes, which is the same place I pull many of the questions for the exam, as such; students that need to miss a class should have a very serious reason to do so. Unless your reason was an unexpected emergency, you need to clear any missed classes with the instructor **before** you miss the class. GET NOTES FROM YOUR FELLOW CLASSMATES.

**Three Papers** will be assigned during the course of the semester. 60% of your grade comes from the points you earn on these three papers. All three will require critical analysis of a given topic, the first will be due at the end of the third week, the second will be due about half way through the semester and the third will be turned in on the last day of class. More details will be given when the papers are assigned. Stay tuned.

"I need an A or a B in this class for my major...to transfer...to keep my funding for school...etc. etc. etc." Unfortunately, this is a sentence I usually hear near the end of the course when the student is panicking about grades, and hasn't taken advantage of any extra credit options or my assistance on papers. Please, take time NOW to seek out opportunities to do well in this course; don't wait until the day before the final to say the above sentence to me. I care, but there is only so much we can do once the class is nearly over.

On that note... Extra credit is a possibility. I believe that not all people are built for exams, information recall under test conditions make some people forget even the most basic of facts. With this in mind I allow students to rewrite their incorrect answers following tests and turn them in for half credit. These rewrites need to be **typed** and in **sentences that reflect both the correct answer as well as the question itself**. By doing this, even if you missed the answer on the exam, I can be sure that you have ultimately had exposure to the info, which is the whole point of taking the class in the first place.

A couple of key points on these rewrites... They are due the week after I hand the exam back to the class. If you are going to miss the class session when I am passing back exams, make arrangements with me to give your exam to somebody else in the

class to get to you, or make arrangements to meet me to get your exam. Once the week has come and gone, we are moving on.

The College has asked me to include some items in my syllabus...here are those items:
