ART 4 PRINCIPLES OF COLOR FALL 2018

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

The study and use of color as an element of art and design. Students are given creative problems exploring the interaction of color and the principles of color harmony.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The primary goal of this course is to build students confidence and knowledge in observing and mixing colors. Second, students will be exposed to various contemporary and historical art references in order to create a broad and well-defined understanding of color terminology and theory. Lastly, students will develop the skills to effectively use and manipulate color in a variety of applications.

Students are encouraged to explore art resources (museums, galleries, libraries and the web) on and off campus as much as possible. Part of your studies in art should include viewing the art of others.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- Class Participation This includes attending class, having materials, paying attention to slide lectures and demonstrations, completing assignments in a timely manner, following directions, classroom clean-up and verbal participation in critiques and class discussions.
- Work Ethic Success and completion of assignments requires motivation, curiosity and effective use of studio time. Students MUST keep an open mind and be accepting to all art making experiences.
- Attendance Students are expected to be punctual and remain for the
 entire class period. Excessive absences and lates or leaving early will
 have a negative effect on final grades. Four or more absences may
 result in the lowering of at least one letter grade. Eight absences may
 result in an automatic "D". Three lates/ leaving early equals one
 absence.
- Portfolio Students are responsible for making up missed work regardless
 of whether an absence is excused or not. Students will store and maintain
 all class work. Wrinkled, folded and/or damaged work is unacceptable.
 Selected work will be due prior to the last week of class presented in
 chronological order and labeled with the name of the assignment. A
 professional presentation is mandatory for an above average grade.
 Portfolios must be an enclosed, envelope folder or tote. At the minimum,
 you may duct tape two pieces of cardboard together. Loose or rolled
 work and portfolios made from drawing pads, paper or bags will be
 rejected and/or considered late. DO NOT USE CLIPS OR RUBBER

- BANDS, STAPLES, ETC.! Late portfolios will be lowered one letter grade. Note: Toxic spray fix must be used away from all buildings.
- Homework In general, students are expected to complete unfinished class work at home. In order to receive an "A" grade, students must complete the Color Progression homework assignment. The *Title V* requirement is two hours of homework per one hour of lecture. The maximum for this course is four hours of homework per week. *Note:* Completing the homework does not guarantee an "A" grade. The work must be above average to receive credit.
- Sketchbook Students will maintain a journal of ideas and technical notes relevant to this class. Think of your sketchbook as a "How to . . ." book.
 Sketchbook should be with you at all times. Note: Try to get into the habit of working daily in your sketchbook.
- Class Conduct No food or open containers in class. No weapons. No
 messaging of any kind on cell phones. No headphones during lectures.
 Students may listen to music through one headphone during studio
 sessions. Students MUST refrain from excessive talking and other
 disruptive behavior. Above all students will respect the opinions and work
 of others. Not adhering to these rules will have a negative affect on final
 grades. Two warnings may lead to a suspension of up to two classes.

STUDENT CONDUCT & ACADEMIC INTEGRITY: Students will conduct themselves in a manner which reflects an awareness of common standards of decency and the rights of others. All students are expected to know the Student Conduct Code (http://www.santarosa.edu/for_students/rules-regulations/scs/section1.shtml) and adhere to it in class. Students who violate the code may be removed from class for up to two (2) class periods and referred to the Dean, DSPS & Student Conduct, for possible discipline sanctions.

Students could be dropped from all their classes for a second offense of cheating or plagiarism. EVALUATION OF CLASS WORK

Class work will be evaluated on a point system. Not all projects address the same objectives therefore the total points for each project will vary. Typically, we will discuss and critique a project at which time students will have an opportunity to make improvements before submitting a project for final evaluation. Work that is incomplete at the time of critique may be lowered within one letter grade.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe visual composition both verbally and in writing, using a vocabulary of terms pertaining specifically to art and design.
- 2. Create a portfolio that synthesizes design elements such as line, value, texture, positive and negative shape, and color principles.
- 3. Practice various techniques, such as drawing, collage and painting.
- 4. Students will become lifelong learners. They will develop the ability to look at a work of design or art and understand how the visual elements communicate to the viewer.

FINAL EVALUATION

The majority of your grade is determined by your in-class performance and the skills you acquire from attending this course. Although grading is specific to the achievements of each individual, students are expected to have a general understanding of the basic concepts explored throughout this course. Higher grades require an advanced level of achievement and commitment to the work inside and outside of class. Letter grades will be based on conceptual comprehension, adherence to course requirements, originality, craft and the evidence of growth. The following will be considered:

12 points: Portfolio: Quality of work, presentation and completeness.

5 points: Sketchbook (notes, thumbnail sketches, further exploration)
20 points: Course Requirements: Attendance, Participation, Work Ethic, etc.

A= Excellent Work, Complete portfolio and sketchbook. Total Participation and Commitment to Course Requirements inside and outside of class, Respect for your work, Willingness to take chances and Grow, Confidently and completely meeting the objectives of the assignments with originality and enthusiasm.

B= Strong Work, Complete portfolio. Above Average Participation and Commitment to Course Requirements, Respect for your work, Generally meeting the objectives of the assignments

C= Average Work (Meeting minimum requirements of the course). Alternatively, students exhibiting a lack of motivation, failure to follow instructions, disruptive behavior, unfinished work and poor attendance will receive average or below average grades.

D or F = Incomplete work, poor work ethic, and/or Failure to Appear P= Meeting minimum requirements of the course (this includes submission of a portfolio for final evaluations.)

Note: Although grades for portfolios and/or work may contain (+) or (-), only whole letter grades will be used for determining final grades.
