COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description: This course is a comparative and historical analysis of society and individual behavior from a multicultural perspective. An examination of American ethnic/cultural groups (African, Asian, European, Latino and Native Americans) and experiences that influence behavior. The relationship between personality development and culture, barriers to cross cultural interaction, and communication styles will also be explored.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Recognize and articulate the social, political, economic, and cultural contexts that characterize individuals/groups.
- 2. Recognize and analyze individual self-awareness of identity and diversity within a socio-cultural context.
- 3. Describe counseling strategies related to the individual characteristics of a client, including but not limited to: disability, gender, sexual orientation, culture, ethnicity, age, and health status.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND EXPECTATIONS

Attendance and Participation:

Examinations: There will be a midterm and final exam for the course. Exams will consist of multiple choice questions, true/false, essay exams, fill-in, and/or short answers.
