# **AGMEC 50: Agricultural Machinery and Equipment Skills**

**CATALOG DESCRIPTION:** This course involves design principles, selection, maintenance, and safe operation of tractors and agricultural equipment. Emphasis will be on proper techniques for the operation and service of common farm implements.

### STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Students will be able to:

- 1. Select appropriate tractors and equipment for field jobs.
- 2. Demonstrate safe operation of tractors and common farm implements based on OSHA requirements and recommendations.
- 3. Perform basic operator level inspection and maintenance of tractors and farm implements.

## **STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES:**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Operate tractors safely and efficiently.
- 2. Summarize basic tractor operating principles.
- 3. Recognize and identify the primary tractor parts.
- 4. Demonstrate proficiency in tractor setup and adjustment.
- 5. Demonstrate proficiency in attaching equipment to the drawbar, three-point hitch, power take-off shaft, and auxiliary hydraulic outlets.
- 6. Manage seasonal tractor field operations.
- 7. Operate specialty equipment safely and efficiently.
- 8. Diagnose basic operational conditions of equipment.
- 9. Evaluate service records and set-up appropriate service plans.
- 10. Perform basic preventive maintenance and repairs.
- 11. Analyze application requirements for spray, seed, and fertilizer applications.
- 12. Calculate equipment calibrations for spray, seed, and fertilizer applications and validate application quantity.

**REQUIRED TEXT BOOKS**: Readings will be provided in class and via email.

### **SUPPLIES REQUIRED:**

- Writing materials
- Appropriate attire for working around farm equipment, i.e. work clothes and closed-toe shoes, hats.
- Safety glasses, ear plugs, and rubber gloves are provided.

### **Grading Category Overview:**

Attendance: Class meets one day per week, so attendance is imperative. Lab time cannot be made up.

<u>Participation</u>: Students are expected to fully engage in all class activities, including lectures, group work, tractor pre-start checks, tractor operation, and any other class activities.

<u>Midterm Exam</u>: A two-part exam in which students will be tested on (1) their fundamental tractor operating skills and (2) their knowledge of important tractor components and controls.

<u>Assignments and Quizzes</u>: Students will be given take-home and in-class assignments and quizzes throughout the semester to help assess student progress.

<u>Final Project</u>: Each student will individually complete a written research project on an agricultural implement or machine that was not discussed in class. Each student will also give a brief presentation of their project to the class.

<u>Final Exam</u>: A two-part exam in which students will be graded on (1) their knowledge of tractor parts and tools related to tractor operation and maintenance and (2) their general knowledge of the theory and practice of agricultural mechanics.
