



Absences



Assignments

The following activities are a combination individual & group activities designed to help understand the speech writing and performance process and meeting the course outcomes. Additional details and rubrics are posted in Canvas.

Quizzes, Critiques, & Discussions 10 pts. each

There will be online and pop quizzes based on the reading, lectures, and in-class activities. These will have multiple choice, true/false, and short answer questions.

Final Exam 100 pts.

This will be a cumulative exam given at the end of class.

Introduction 50 pts.

In this speech, you will introduce yourself to the class. This will be recorded.

TED Talk 100 pts.

In this speech, you will craft a short speech about an opinion you have that you think the world would benefit from

Informative 150 pts.

The goal of informative speaking is to teach or enhance and understanding of skill, concept, or theory.

Persuasive 150 pts.

Advocacy is an important part of public speaking. In this speech you will analyze a controversial issue and advocate for its solution.

Impromptu 100 pts.

For this speech, you will be given a quote or topic. You will have 3 minutes to prepare a 5-minute speech on that topic.

Participation 100 pts.

Participation is required in this class. It is comprised of attendance, development of a canvas profile, quantity and quality of in class and online interaction, and participation with your speech partner.

Extra Credit 40 pts.

You will analyze a historical speech looking at the use of rhetoric and performance.

You are highly encouraged to have passed your English 1A before taking this class.
