Assignments

The following activities are a combination individual & group activities designed to help understand the speech writing and performance process.

This class is based on a standard scale.

100-90% = A 89-80% = B 79-70% = C 69-60% = D 59% or less = F

Online Quizzes & Discussions 10 points each

There will be online quizzes & discussions based on the reading, lectures, and in-class activities. (SLO #1 & #2)

Cultural Investigation Paper & Presentation 100 pts

You will do some research and perform an interview with someone who comes from a different racial, ethnic, or national background. You will write a 5-7 page paper and give a 3-5 minute presentation on the experience. (SLO #1)

Book Club & Presentation

100 pts

You will read and discuss a book that deals with intercultural issues of your choosing. (SLO #2)

Studying Culture in Public & Paper 100 pts

You will attend a film screening on campus or attend a museum tour. Then write a 2-3 page response about your experience making sure to apply intercultural theories of your choosing. (SLO's #2 & #3)

Exams I & II

100 pts each

These will be multiple choice, true/false, and short exams based on the reading and lecture. They will be administered through an online format. (SLO's #1, #2, & #3)

Participation

100 pts

Participation is required in this class. It is comprised of attendance and quality of in class interaction. (SLO's #1 & #3)

Extra Credit

25 pts each

You will have 2 options for 25 points each to attend intercultural activities and write a paper about your experience.
