2) In Class:

You are responsible for using Japanese as much as possible and practicing the target structures and vocabulary. Please pay attention to your pronunciation and intonation. You should perform naturally and appropriately according to the given situation. Also, you are required to conduct yourself according to Japanese social conventions. No personal food in class, and take off your hat and sunglasses, please. Culturally inappropriate behavior interferes with smooth communication.

We will conduct ourselves in a manner which reflects our awareness of common standards of decency and the rights of others. All students are expected to know the Student Conduct Code (<u>http://www.santarosa.edu/for_students/rules-regulations/scs/section1.shtml</u>) and adhere to it in this class. Students who violate the code may be suspended from two classes and referred to Vice President of Student Services for discipline.

The best way to learn is through active participation; therefore, we respect others when talking by being on time, listening actively, and being polite even when we disagree. Please turn off the ringer of all electronic devices. You are not allowed to use a cell phone (text messages included) during class unless you are expecting an emergency call. If you use a laptop for note-taking, please sit in the front row with the sound off.

2) Grading Policies

- a. The grading will not be curved. It will be given according to how much progress as well as the effort you make between the beginning and the end of the semester. While your effort plays a crucial role in your grade, that is not enough. You must demonstrate the progress of your functional ability of your spoken and written Japanese. Your effort will be demonstrated by your commitment to your homework, participation in class activities and successful use of Japanese.
- b. For class participation, students will be given a grade (0–2) for each class, which I will record every time. (2: active participation based on good knowledge of material; 1: participation with fair knowledge of material; 0: poor or no participation)
- c. As part of the midterm, an oral exam will be given in the form of an individual interview during office hours and part of class. After the interview, you and I will discuss your progress as well as your questions, concerns, or suggestions, if any.
- d. There will be several small quizzes. In case of more than 5 quizzes, the lowest score will be dropped.
- e. Students are responsible for completing homework assignments as assigned. Homework can only be completed outside of class in <u>non-erasable blue or black pen</u>.
- f. Homework will usually be corrected in the classroom. While homework can be marked in class with a red pen, such work may not be presented as work completed at home. Homework grade is earned as follows: 2: completed, 1: not completed or poorly completed, 0: blank.
- g. Late assignments and makeup exams will not be accepted unless you have *a very good* reason, as determined by the instructor.

3) Final Grades

Students may **withdraw** from class without instructor permission and without incurring any grade penalty until the W deadline. This grade may be requested by the student only during the first two-thirds of any session and may be given by the instructor on or before the official census reporting date to students who have ceased attending class before that date. Students who stop attending class after this date may receive a grade of "F."

Students may check final grades at the online student portal approximately one week after the final exam. For privacy and security reasons, instructors may not post or give grades over the telephone or through e-mail. If you need an official grade report in the mail, please submit a self-addressed envelope with sufficient postage. During the semester, your grade points for individual elements will be available through the Canvas gradebook. The last day to report any missing grades is the review session before the final. No further changes will be made to the gradebook after this date.

The grade of "I" (incomplete) may be requested only with a valid, verifiable excuse and only if the student has successfully completed all but a small portion of the required coursework with a passing grade (at least 70% of the coursework must be complete). A student requesting an incomplete must do so by 24 hours after the final exam. An incomplete may be given only at the discretion of the instructor.

4) Attendance Policy

Absences, arriving to class late and leaving class early are counterproductive to learning. If you cannot come to class or need to leave class early, notify the instructor **before** class starts, sit close to the exit and leave without disturbing the instructor or other students. If you are 10 minutes late or leave 10 minutes early, it will lower the participation grade; if you arrive 30 minutes or more late or leave 30 minutes or more early, it will be counted as an absence (0 participation grade).

If you miss all or part of a class, you are responsible for obtaining any notes, announcements, etc. Attendance credit may not be provided without documentation such as a doctor's note. If you miss class **three** times or more for any reason, you should seriously consider withdrawing from the course due to the difficulty in making up missed material, and the teacher reserves the right to withdraw the student.

Missing the first two classes may also result in you being withdrawn from the course to allow other students to enroll. Students are responsible for officially withdrawing from the course if they stop attending.
