Final Project:

Over this course, you will create a bibliography on a research topic of your choice. For the Final Project, you will review the bibliography you have created and find a last source, the "missing piece." I will provide the criteria and instructions for locating this "missing piece" source in the final week of the course.

Final exam:

The final exam is given the last week of class and will require you to reflect on acquired research skills. The test will be open-book and may consist of short answer/essay questions and/or multiple choice questions.
