Course Description:

Comm 51A is a three-unit course designed to develop proficiency in the practical application of public speaking. The course examines how speaking in public cultivates leadership skills and assists participants in developing communication strategies for applied contexts *of their own choosing*. The nature of advocacy, including exigent and precipitating conditions, as well as historical examples, will be explored. The recommended preparation for this course is eligibility for ENGL 1A. This course fulfills requirements for the SRJC AA degree and is transferable to the CSU. *Student Learning Outcomes:* Upon completion of the course, students will be able to (1) Deliver a speech to a public audience; (2) Explain how public oration is a form of advocacy and leadership, and (3) Identify and develop leadership speaking skills.

Course Objectives:

The overall objective of this course is to obtain public speaking experience in an applied communication setting. You may decide to produce a podcast, deliver a business training, engage in debates (competitive, assistant coaching, or non-competitive via facilitation with the Forensics Team), or learn to address varied audiences within the community (i.e. the City Council, Toastmasters, or the Board of Trustees). This includes assessment of the communication context, determination of the role of influence, analysis of the intended audience, construction and delivery of content, and reflection regarding strategic effectiveness. You will also learn about the conditions that foster advocacy and situations that compel leadership. We will explore the idea of the leadership "moment" and theories about what leadership is and how it operates through the communication exchange. By the end of the course, you should be able to identify leadership styles, the primary theories about leadership, and the transformative periods in history that were shaped by orators.
