CSKLS 732, GED/HiSET Prep Preparation II Section 1642, Fall 2020 Course Syllabus

Course Description

This short, eight-week course will provide instruction and individualized learning plans to prepare for the Language Arts, Reading & Writing portion of the GED or HiSET tests. It will also highlight Social Studies content.

If a student doesn't show up ...

Students who fail to attend the first, class meeting may be dropped by the instructor.

Instructors are required to drop all No-Show students immediately following the second, class meeting. A No-Show is an enrolled student who has not attended any class meeting of the course.

Any student with two (2) or more consecutive absences, without giving notice, may be dropped from the class. It is strongly advised that if you need to miss more than one class in a row that you contact the instructor to avoid being dropped from the class. Any student who is dropped may register for this class again.

It's your responsibility to come prepared to class each day, to be ready to participate and to answer or ask questions on the topic being covered.

Grading Policy

CSKLS 731/CSKLS 732 are noncredit courses. However, attendance, class participation, and showing satisfactory progress in attaining Language Arts, Reading and Writing skills necessary to pass the Language Arts portion(s) of either the GED or HiSET test are the main components of your final grade. Possible grades to be issued at the end of the course are:

- **P** = **Pass.** All the necessary skills to achieve the goal are accomplished and/or the Language Arts subtest(s) for the HSE of the student's choice is passed;
- SP = Satisfactory Progress. The student continues to work on the skills within a certain level but has not completed them all yet. The student is encouraged to continue by registering in College Skills (CSKLS) GED/HiSET Prep courses, and continue to work on them.
- **NP = No Progress.** The student has been attending, but has not completed enough work to show progress. He or she is invited to return the next semester to retake this course.
- **W** = Withdraw. The student does not have a study plan and has not attended enough hours to show progress. The student is invited to come back the next semester to retake this course.

Standards of Conduct

Each class/lecture session will consist of a combination of the following three components:

- 1. A mini-lecture, and/or

During the 8-week class, the content covered may include units of study in punctuation, building sentences and other writing basics, evaluating evidence in persuasive essays, writing a persuasive essay, and more.

- 1. While in class, listen actively and take notes, apply new concepts to practice activities, and ask questions of both the instructor and fellow students. Class time is your chance to get the help and explanations you need so you don't have to struggle to learn the material on your own.
