Course Description

This course reviews the medical and pharmacological aspects of alcohol and psychoactive substances. Students will also review theories and research pertaining to chemical dependency, pharmacological actions of drugs, drug classifications, medical and physical effects of alcohol and other drugs. The potential for abuse and dependency, and how psychoactive substances affect the mind and body will also be reviewed.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe the medical and pharmacological resources available in the treatment of substance use disorders.
- 2. Recognize and describe the differences and similarities between and among physical and psychological dependency, tolerance and withdrawal.
- 3. Recognize and screen clients for psychoactive substance toxicity, intoxication, and withdrawal symptoms.

Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify the progressive stages of the disease of chemical dependency.
- 2. Describe and list the most commonly abused drugs and their effects on the body.
- 3. Recognize and analyze the basic metabolic and neurological processes involved in drug use.
- 4. Describe the social effects of psychoactive substances on the user.
- 5. Describe the special service needs and staff precautions necessary when working with clients who may be HIV, hepatitis, STI or tuberculosis positive.
- 6. Analyze in writing the risk and intervention issues associated with prenatal drug use.

Assignments

Paper 1: Analysis of Substance Use Effects: Due 3/29/21 by 5pm

3-5 page paper analyzing the effects of a specific drug. Watch one of the documentaries listed below and write a paper describing the following: levels of use depicted, biopsychosocial impacts of the drug on individuals portrayed (both positive and negative), reasons for using the particular drug(s), experience of withdrawal (if shown), and whether the impacts portrayed are realistic based on information provided in the text. Provide citations for all references to the book.

Paper 2: Critique on Treatment Modalities: Due 5/03/21 by 5pm

3-5 page paper exploring treatment modalities. Read any three SAMHSA Advisory publications on treatment of substance use disorders (found at:

https://store.samhsa.gov/?v=treatment_prevention_and_recovery). Write a paper that includes the following:

- Comparison of the treatment modalities provided
- Identification of treatment modalities you are interested in learning
- Overview of how to learn those modalities (this will require additional research)

Paper 3: Evaluation of a Bay Area Treatment Program: Due 5/24/21 by 5pm

3-5 page overview of a local substance abuse treatment program. The paper may be written individually or in groups of up to three students. Sources for this paper need to include: interview of at least one staff person, review of any public materials (brochures, annual report, website), review of financial information in GuideStar (if the treatment program is a non-profit agency). If written in a group, all team members must be present for the interview.

Agency overview must include the following components:

- Program name, address, and the name and title of the person interviewed
- Population served including: number of clients served at any given time and annually, genders served, languages, substance abuse disorders addressed
- Treatment modalities used, the amount of programming offered (i.e., sessions per day/week), and educational level of staff providing various services
- Funding sources and size of the agency budget
- How outcomes are measured and what outcomes were for the last year (if available)
- The strengths and weaknesses of the program from the interviewee's perspective

In addition, add your analysis of the following:

- Based on information from readings and class, how does the program align with the best practices?
- What changes would you make to improve the program?
- What types of clients would you refer to this program?

Quizzes

There will be three quizzes, each worth 30 points. Quizzes will cover the most important material from the sections they cover. Quiz for chapters 1-2 on 3/1; chapters 3-6 on 4/5, and chapters 7-9 on 5/3. Study guides will be given out the week before each quiz.

Exams

There will be a midterm on 3/15 and a final on 5/24. Both exams will be comprised of multiple-choice, short answer, and essay exams. The material covered by the exams will include information from class presentations, guest speakers, and assigned reading. There will be material on exams covered in one only venue (i.e. reading OR class presentations). The final will be comprehensive and cover material from the entire course.
