Course Introduction

- Doing the work The learning activities in this class are carefully selected and offered

Course Description

A basic course in drawing and composition to develop a student's ability to perceive and define shape, mass, contour, volume, space, and light, using a variety of graphic media and subject matter.

Course Objectives

What are you are going to learn throughout this course? Creative problem solving is an underlining skill taught in all college level courses. Whether your educational interests lie within the sciences or mathematics or even political science, learning to observe is vital to your success. All the following goals (objectives) listed below are designed to help expand your creativity and no matter what your educational ambitions are, by the end of this course you will be a more proficient creative problem solver.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Create compositions, revise preliminary sketches, and experiment with a variety of tools and approaches to drawing.
- 2. Make critical choices about their own work and assemble a portfolio of drawings demonstrating ability.
- 3. Practice drawing dynamics to create value using a variety of drawing materials and synthesize art historical approaches with self-expression.

Objectives

Students will be able to:

- 1. Develop an understanding of perspective and apply to drawing skills.
- 2. Synthesize pictorial elements such as shape, form, value, line and texture in drawing.
- 3. Recognize diverse points of view in respect to systems of perspective and composition.
- 4. Combine risk-taking and experimentation with disciplined work habits as an aspect of the creative process.
- 5. Experiment with and distinguish between black and white drawing media: ink, pencil, charcoal, conte crayon and various drawing surfaces.
- 6. Define basic drawing and design terminology.
- 7. Analyze and identify master techniques in drawing.
- 8. Develop drawings from general to specific.

- 9. Appraise relationships of positive and negative space in a composition.
- 10. Evaluate their work and the work of others in verbal critiques.
- 11. Analyze the proportions of a single object and analyze proportional relationships between objects.

This course is cumulative. In order to succeed, you must apply and relate previous techniques and ideas to future concepts. Inability to do so will result in a failing grade.

A student who does not take a final exam and who does not qualify for an incomplete will be assigned a failing grade for the exam/project. Note that this course has a lecture and lab final exam. Students are required to attend both final exam classes during finals week.

Late assignments will be graded down one entire letter grade for each day it is late, up to two class meetings. Any work over two class periods will not be accepted and student will receive a zero. Late final projects will not be accepted. If a student misses a due because due to illness, he or she must provide a doctor's note by EOD the assignment is due. Any documentation must be original.

Critiques and Quizzes & Tests

A critique is designed to constructively facilitate discussion to help evaluate any given assignment. Students are expected and required to participate. Lack of participation will impact project grading. The class will be forewarned before a quiz is given. For each project there will be a critique. Two quizzes will be given during the semester. Critiques will be conducted in both group, classroom and individual settings. A test on all terminology, principles and elements of design and Gestalt as well as value and color will also be given. Look to the course schedule for dates of tests and quizzes.

Participation and Attendance

Students are required to work during scheduled class time and are expected to be in class on time. Timely attendance is your responsibility; I do not want to waste class time reminding you about it, but you are accountable. If you miss a class, take the initiative to talk to a classmate about what you have missed, then to me about make up work.

Since this is a studio course, attendance and participation are mandatory. In order to participate you must be present and on time for each class. Each student must come prepared to each class with necessary materials, ready and engaged with a positive attitude. Poor work ethic, lack of materials (get a locker to house supplies), inadequate willingness, leaving early and habitual tardiness will result in low marks towards participation. If a student is working on any other assignment not pertaining to course or not on task with assigned material, student will be asked to leave and marked as absent for the day. Each student is required to fill out and sign an attendance sheet. Your final grade for the course will drop by 5% each class meeting the attendance sheet is late. Attendance sheet is due first class of the second week. We will take one 15 min. break at the half-way mark of class unless stated otherwise by the professor. Returning late from break will count as a late. Please begin clean-up only when prompted by instructor.

Absence Policy

Being prompt and prepared for each class meeting is necessary to successfully complete the course. If you are late you will be marked absent for the meeting. Absences will affect your grade as follows:

- 1-2 absences will not affect grade
- 3 absences drop grade by 5%
- 4 absences drop grade by 10% (one letter grade)
- 5 absences drop grade by 15%
- 6 absences drop grade by 20%
- 7 absences, student will receive a failing grade or dropped if accrued before the drop date

Absences due to emergencies, such as accidents, death in the family, etc.may be excused at the professor's discretion after the two absences have been used. Must have appropriate documentation/proof of extenuating circumstances in order to have absence considered for removal.

It is the student's responsibility to find out what you missed during your absence. I advise that you obtain two student contacts at the beginning of the class to help retrieve any missed information. I will not repeat course information or demonstrations to students who were absent and an email asking what you missed will be ignored.

If a student is late 3 times it will count as an absence. Every late after will continue to count as an absence. Leaving the meeting early, lack of preparation, disruption of class, etc. will be marked as a late towards attendance.

- Conceptual and expressive development (visual intelligence, power of perception, and disciplined creative sensitivity)
- Skill and style development (technique)
- Effort devoted to work, as evidenced in finished work (time commitment)

Writing Requirement

You will have a writing assignment critiquing an artwork from a museum. You must use proper punctuation and grammar, incorporate terminology learned in class, and cite your sources (if you do not know how to do this, visit the library or writing lab. These papers will range from 2-3 pages, double-spaced and include terminology learned throughout the course. A grading rubric and overview module will be provided.
