Course Introduction

I appreciate it when students pay attention to class happenings, when you're willing to try new things and to ask questions, and are not scared of getting things wrong.

This class is an opportunity to practice "professionalism," in addition to learning about design. In design, and in a lot of other areas, being professional includes thinking carefully, doing work that's well beyond the minimum of quality, being respectful and courteous to others, and meeting obligations without fuss. For this class specifically, professionalism means:

- Doing the work The learning activities in this class are carefully selected and offered
 to help you learn. I strive to avoid busywork. If you don't understand why we're doing
 something, please ask! Since we're remote, you will need to exercise more personal
 initiative than if we were meeting face to face, and that's a great skill to have for your
 future.
- Professional courtesy Come on time, prepared, and tune in the whole time. Pay attention, listen to others and be ready to talk and participate. If you can't attend a class meeting, make sure you contact another student to see what you missed and fully participate in the digital interactions.

This class will demand significant time, at least 7 hours per week, depending on the assignment. Calendar the time!

The course is organized into cumulative assignments in the form of exercises and projects. Each assignment topic will contain tutorial videos and demonstrations, assignment examples, critique discussions, learning outcomes, lectures and handouts.

This course is cumulative which means that you will need to complete the exercises in sequential order to be successful. For example, in mathematics, it would be really difficult to understand multiplication without first comprehending addition, right? Design is the same!

Catalog Description

An introductory studio course in the fundamentals of art and design using shape, value, texture, line, pattern, color and space through exercises in drawing, painting, and collage. The course is accepted for transfer at both the UC and CSU systems.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe visual composition by using a vocabulary of terms pertaining specifically to art and design.
- 2. Create a portfolio that synthesizes design elements such as line, value, texture, positive and negative shape, and color principles.
- 3. Practice various techniques, such as drawing, collage and painting.
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to look at a work of design or art and evaluate how the visual elements communicate to the viewer.

Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop perception and awareness of visual elements such as line, shape, value, texture, color, volume and space.
- 2. Define basic color terms such as hue, complement, analogous, saturation, grey scale and color wheel.
- 3. Develop perception and visual awareness of visual composition and ways of organizing the visual elements such as positive/negative shape, harmony/tension, unity/variety, organic/geometric.
- 4. Employ hand skills necessary for the basic mastery of the control of various artists' media including: charcoal, paper, acrylic paint and tools such as palette knives, brushes and X-acto knives.
- 5. Develop and exercise ability to perform basic measuring, scaling and positioning necessary to organize the two-dimensional picture plane.
- 6. Exercise ability to make critical aesthetic judgments through class critiques.
- 7. Combine risk-taking and experimentation with disciplined work habits as part of the creative process.

- 8. Examine and analyze examples of fine art and applied design, historical and contemporary, within a global context.
- 9. Define health and safety issues that could arise from the use of artists' materials.
- 10. Describe the values, themes, methods and history of the discipline and identify realistic career objectives related to a course of study in the major.

Grading

Assignments in the form of projects and exercises will be given throughout the course. All assignments must be completed on time and will be due at the beginning of class on the due date, unless specified otherwise. Assignments not turned in on time at the beginning of class will be considered late. Late assignments will be graded down one entire grade for each day they are late, up to two class periods. Any work not turned in within the two class periods after due date will no longer be accepted and student will receive a zero for the assignment. Late final projects will not be accepted.

- Exercises are small assignments, worth fewer points than projects and are practiced to introduce a larger concept. Will be executed both at home and in the classroom and vary depending upon class necessity.
- *Projects* are larger assignments; worth approx. 50% of course grade and will combine multiple concepts. Will be executed both at home and in the classroom.

Grading Policy:

All assignments will be graded on a point system. The number of points per assignment will vary depending on the type of assignment. Grade evaluation is as follows (as applicable to a given assignment):

- · how well the student fulfills the goals of a given assignment, comprehension of concepts
- technical quality and overall craft
- · aesthetic quality/visual effectiveness of design
- · work habits, time management and time commitment as evident in finished work
- creative and conceptual involvement and quality
- please note that a heavy time commitment does not necessarily mean a high grade on any given assignment

Final Exam Policy:

A student who does not take a final exam and who does not qualify for an incomplete will be assigned a failing grade for the exam/project. Note that this course has a lecture and lab final exam. Students are required to attend both final exam classes during finals week.

Late Work Policy

Late assignments will be graded down one entire letter grade for each day it is late, up to two class meetings. Any work over two class periods will not be accepted and student will receive a zero. Late final projects will not be accepted. If a student misses a due because due to illness, he or she must provide a doctor's note by EOD the assignment is due. Any documentation must be original.

Homework and Staying Focused

Please be aware that the general homework policy is for every 1 hour of class time, allow 2 hours for homework. Some assignments may take more time, depending upon your commitment towards the grading policy. Studio courses and projects are time consuming and may take hours to formulate, thus the project deadlines have been designed to give the student optimum time to execute. Stay focused and balanced throughout the semester as to not become overwhelmed near the due date of any given assignment.

Critiques and Quizzes & Tests

A critique is designed to constructively facilitate discussion to help evaluate any given assignment. Students are expected and required to participate. Lack of participation will impact project grading. The class will be forewarned before a quiz is given. For each project there will be a critique. Two quizzes will be given during the semester. Critiques will be conducted in both group, classroom and individual settings. A test on all terminology, principles and elements of design and Gestalt as well as value and color will also be given. Look to the course schedule for dates of tests and quizzes.

Participation and Attendance

Students are required to work during scheduled class time and are expected to be in class on time. Timely attendance is your responsibility; I do not want to waste class time reminding you about it, but you are accountable. If you miss a class,

take the initiative to talk to a classmate about what you have missed, then to me about make up work.

Since this is a studio course, attendance and participation are mandatory. In order to participate you must be present and on time for each class. Each student must come prepared to each class with necessary materials, ready and engaged with a positive attitude. Poor work ethic, lack of materials (get a locker to house supplies), inadequate willingness, leaving early and habitual tardiness will result in low marks towards participation. If a student is working on any other assignment not pertaining to course or not on task with assigned material, student will be asked to leave and marked as absent for the day. Each student is required to fill out and sign an attendance sheet. Your final grade for the course will drop by 5% each class meeting the attendance sheet is late. Attendance sheet is due first class of the second week. We will take one 15 min. break at the half-way mark of class unless stated otherwise by the professor. Returning late from break will count as a late. Please begin clean-up only when prompted by instructor.

Absence Policy:

Being prompt and prepared for each class meeting is necessary to successfully complete the course. If you are late you will be marked absent for the meeting. Absences will affect your grade as follows:

- 1-2 absences will not affect grade
- 3 absences drop grade by 5%
- 4 absences drop grade by 10% (one letter grade)
- 5 absences drop grade by 15%
- 6 absences drop grade by 20%
- 7 absences, student will receive a failing grade or dropped if accrued before the drop date

Absences due to emergencies, such as accidents, death in the family, etc.may be excused at the professor's discretion after the two absences have been used. Must have appropriate documentation/proof of extenuating circumstances in order to have absence considered for removal.

It is the student's responsibility to find out what you missed during your absence. I advise that you obtain two student contacts at the beginning of the class to help retrieve any missed information. I will not repeat course information or demonstrations to students who were absent and an email asking what you missed will be ignored.

If a student is late 3 times it will count as an absence. Every late after will continue to count as an absence. Leaving the meeting early, lack of preparation, disruption of class, etc. will be marked as a late towards attendance.
