Course Description

Fire 71 is a 3-unit core Fire Technology course that provides an overview to fire protection and emergency services, career opportunities in fire protection and related fields; culture and history of emergency services, fire loss analysis; organization and function of public and private fire protection services; fire departments as a part of local government, laws and regulations affecting the fire service, fire service nomenclature, specific fire protection functions, basic fire chemistry and physics, introduction to fire protection systems, introduction to fire strategy and tactics and life safety initiatives. .

The best way to move through the class is to use the modules and select next at the bottom of the page so that you do not miss any content. Quizzes are required for 14 Units to assess your knowledge of the subject. There will be no quiz for Units 15 or 16. This time should be spent on your final assessment which is an in-depth reflection of what you learned from the class. It will include a 3-question interview from 2 of your classmates. This Adobe Express peer reviewed assessment will be seen as your final exam as well as graded by the instructor.

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1. Describe the fire science educational path and the firefighter selection process.
2. Identify and describe fire protection career opportunities in the fire service.
3. Describe the history of fire protection in America and the current public fire protection system.

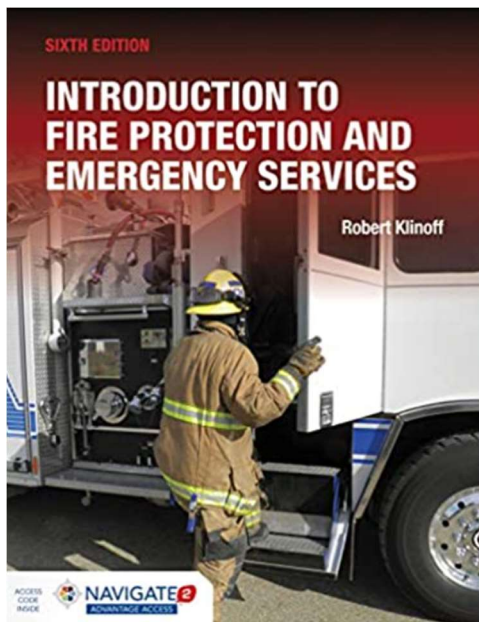

Dropping the Class

If you decide to drop this course, it is your responsibility to officially drop it. Late Policy

All assignments are due at 11:59 PM [Pacific Standard Time] on the due date. A late submission will receive a zero until submitted. Submissions more than one week late will not be accepted without prior arrangement. There will be modules that allow you to go back and submit past due assignments for partial grades. Look for Extra Credit discussions in the modules to make up missed points.

Quizzes and Assessments

There are 14 online quizzes. The midterm is not your typical exam assessment. The midterm will be a student reflection of the materials covered in the text and online materials. Group projects will be assigned during the class. The final exam will incorporate information from the texts and lessons in the Adobe Express presentation. The material for the quizzes come from the textbook and lessons. If any quiz or assessment is missed, a zero will be recorded as the score. It is your responsibility to take the quizzes by the due date. The final assessment which is an in-depth reflection of what you learned from the class, including a 3-question interview from 2 of your classmates in an Adobe Express presentation. Interview videos can be imbedded into your Adobe Express presentation. The presentation submittal will be due the week prior to the final Module and the peer review will be the last discussion assignment to complete the class. Because of your busy lives, two of the lowest quiz scores will be dropped from the final score.

Adobe “Express” Presentation

Students ARE REQUIRED to complete the final assessment Adobe Express presentation as the final exam. It will consist of a minimum of 10 pictures, but no more than 15. (Students who choose not to submit a presentation will receive an F for the course.) The presentation will be based upon a reflection of what the student has learned from the class including the two student interviews as described on the assignment page or as approved by the instructor. The presentation can focus on student interest such as fire training, laws, prevention, protection systems, fuels management, emergency operations, etc. The presentation **must** include the works cited within the presentation. This assignment will be broken into three mandatory submittals. The final submittal will be the full presentation. The presentation must be submitted through Canvas (Assignment Link). Grades for late presentations will not be accepted unless arrangements are made prior to the deadline. The due date is provided on the Unit Content Table. See the Rubric for the Presentation on the assignment page. All three submittals are REQUIRED MANDATORY assignments. Students who do not complete the assignments FAIL the course.

Start looking in your local area or news for pictures you want to use in your presentation. As the class progresses, think about what questions you may want to ask your peers.

Contact the instructor if you are a visually disabled student and need an alternative assignment.

Online Discussion Attendance

Networking is extremely important for firefighters and fire service professionals at all levels. More than likely, each of you will only know each other by email addresses or ZOOM Meetings. So as the instructor, I made a Student Lounge Discussion area where you can talk with each other. We will have some seasoned firefighters and fire professionals in the class, so it is a great place to network and ask questions. I will not be monitoring this discussion area. So be professional and polite. That person may turn out to be your Captain someday. A second Q&A Discussion Board is available. I will be checking this, but if you can answer the questions among each other and help each other, that would be the best outcome. Since participation in online class is important, we are going to have a group discussion every Unit. It is so important it is worth 20 points. There are posted questions to start the discussion, but you can comment on what you perceived or thought. Make sure you explain in detail your observation. Feedback is important so make sure to comment back to another student to receive the full 20 points.

DIRECTIONS for Discussion Success:

Discussions will be shared throughout the class. You must take part in the discussion the week of the discussion according to the Unit dates for full credit. Students must supply a first post by Tuesday at 11:59 PM, provide a minimum of one comment to other student's posts by Thursday at 11:59 PM. Both the first post and additional posts must be at least 100 words or more. Your first post will be worth 15 points and your answer back will be worth 5 points.

I leave all discussions open during the class for students who wish to continue the dialogue, however the discussions are graded shortly after the week they are due according to the calendar of events.

There may be discussions that I ask for you to use Flipgrid or be used for extra credit. The requirements for these discussions will clearly be spelled out on that Unit's Discussion Page. Follow the Rubric for full points.

Grading Policy

Click the "Grades" link in Canvas to keep track of your grades. I grade weekly (usually Mondays) and post grades and comments in the Canvas grade book. Modules may include the extra credit assignments.
