Welcome to Class:

I look forward to working with you to improve your English language skills this semester. For many of us, we are returning back to the classroom after two years of the Covid-19 pandemic. Although the pandemic is not over yet, we are learning to better adjust to it. You might have noticed that we now have many new safety protocols and expectations at school-these are intended to keep everyone safe.

Please communicate with me if you have questions or if there is anything that prevents you from being successful in class. I will do my best to support you and connect you with SRJC resources that might be able to help!

In addition to you learning the materials in class, I want everyone to be healthy and safe this semester. These are my expectations for everyone's safety:

- Wear a mask at all times in the classroom. Even though masks are optional at SRJC, if we all wear a fitted mask that covers our nose and mouth, we will all be safer. All the top doctors recommend wearing masks! They work!

Course Description:

This is an intermediate reading, writing, and grammar course focusing on the development of pre-academic reading skills with particular emphasis on comprehension, critical thinking, vocabulary, and rate. Paragraph structure and introduction to essays, including writing, revising, and editing. Emphasis on tenses and the development of varied sentence structure. Review of high-beginning grammar and punctuation. Designed for non-native speakers of English.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):

After completing this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Apply critical thinking skills to respond to adapted selections of fiction and nonfiction
- 2. Apply the writing process to produce paragraphs and short essays that demonstrate level-appropriate organization and content, critical thinking, vocabulary and fluency, and grammatical accuracy
- 3. Comprehend intermediate reading passages by identifying organizational strategies, paraphrasing and summarizing, and using main ideas and details to support writing assignments
- 4. Word-process essays and access information on the Internet
- 5. Utilize meta-cognitive thinking skills in learning and studying processes
- 6. Utilize SRJC resources and services to realize academic goals

Dropping the Class:

Also, if you have several consecutive, unexplained absences, I may drop you from the class. An unexplained absence is one where you have not communicated with me to let me know why you were not in attendance.

Pass/No Pass (P/NP) for 371 only

You may take this class with a "Pass/No Pass" (P/NP) option. You must file for the P/NP option no later than Friday, December 16, 2022 by submitting your request online through the ESL Tutoring & Learning Center (TLC Petaluma) or file the P/NP form with Admissions and Records. With a grade of C or better, you will get P.

Once you choose P/NP, you cannot change back to a letter grade. If you are taking this course as part of a certificate program, you can probably still take the class as a P/NP grade. Check with a counselor to be sure.



Attendance Policy:

Learning a new language requires a serious commitment from you. What does that mean? It means—you attend class, participate in discussions, engage with your teacher and your fellow students and complete your assignments so that you are fully prepared and ready to contribute to our class community. With your efforts to achieve this commitment, you will have learned the skills from one lesson and will be able to apply them to new lessons.

Also, tardiness will affect your grade. When you are tardy, you miss important information, and you disrupt your classmates as well as your teacher.

If you do miss a class, make sure you keep up with assignments. Class materials will be posted on Canvas. I also recommend that you have a fellow student's contact information so that you can get updates on what you missed in class.

Assignments, Homework and Late Policy:

You will have homework after each class. All assignments are due by the time stated in Canvas (due date). If, for some reason you are having personal issues, please let me know and I will evaluate a possible solution. However, if you do not contact me, a late submission will receive a 10% late penalty. Submissions more than one week late are not accepted without prior agreement with me.

Exams:

We will have reading, vocabulary, writing and grammar quizzes throughout the semester. In addition, there will be a midterm and a final exam. The material comes from the textbook, class lectures and supplemental materials. If any exam is missed, a zero will be recorded as the score. It is your responsibility to take all exams by the due date. If or any reason you cannot take a quiz or exam on the due date, contact me in advance.

Grading Policy:

Visit "Grades" in Canvas to keep track of your grades. We will examine this Canvas feature in class to familiarize you with the process. When you complete an assignment, I will review it, provide you with feedback and post your grade. I will show you in class, how you can review my feedback for your writing assignments in Google docs. I will do my best to return your assignments to you within one week (7 days), as per SRJC policy. If you are new to Canvas, it is good to know that your grade is only visible to you and me.



Your grade will be based on your attendance, class participation, homework, writing and tests. SRJC requires that you take a final exam to pass the class, so please plan accordingly.

- **371 Students:** You can either earn a letter grade (A-F) for this class, or choose the option to have a P/NP grade
- **781 students**: You will earn a P=Pass, SP= Sufficient Progress or NP=No Pass

To earn a passing grade (371 or 781), you must earn at least 70% and complete the midterm and final exams.

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Road to "Success":

- 1. ESL 371/781 Intermediate Reading and Writing is a nine-unit class (9 class hours per week), which means that we will spend about 8-9 hours together every week.
 - a. Plan to spend <u>at least</u> 10-11 additional hours on homework and studying.
 - b. Depending on your level of English proficiency, you may find that you need to spend even more time.
 - c. You will use Canvas to access homework, quizzes, tests, and other activities for this class.
- 2. Paragraph and essay writing assignments will require 2 or more drafts. I highly recommend that you take advantage of my office hours, my ESL 770 support class, and especially our Petaluma writing and tutoring center.
- 3. Allow plenty of time to read the textbook articles and the novel. You will encounter and learn lots of new vocabulary. As you do so, you will often need to read assigned readings more than one time. You will also need to take notes as you read. We will be learning how to do this in class.
- Do your homework. All homework assignments are designed to help you with your reading and writing. If you miss homework assignments, writing your summaries, journals, paragraphs or essays will be much more difficult.
- 5. Don't miss the class and Zoom meetings. If you are absent or any reason, please notify me. However, if you are running a fever and/or have been exposed to a virus such as the Covid-19 virus, do not attend in-person classes until your doctor or the SRJC Health Center clears you for attendance in public venues.



- 6. During the first week of class, make a couple of new classroom buddies and get their contact information (name, email address). This will allow you not only to look at Canvas for missed assignments, but also find out what else we discussed and covered during the class you missed. This will help you to be aware of what you need to accomplish your your homework assignments. Don't come to class and ask me, "Did I miss anything?" ... the answer is always "Yes, a lot!"
- 7. Be sure to use your own words in your writing. I'm an English teacher and I can easily tell when you copy the words of others. You are in my class to learn and the only way to do that is to put in the effort, make mistakes, learn from those mistakes so that you can improve the essential skills of reading and writing. The only way you will learn to write is to do your own work and perhaps soon you will discover that it can be fun!
- 8. Be an active participant not only in class, but also turn on your camera in our online Zoom meetings. These meetings prepare you to better understand class readings and also write your summaries, paragraphs, and essays because you get new ideas from your classmates, which can stimulate your thinking and help you generate and clarify ideas in your writing.

Working Together

In my class everyone is welcome! That means that we respect all individuals from all cultures, ethnicities, gender orientation and economic backgrounds. We all bring knowledge into the classroom, and we all have our stories to share, from which we all can learn. Working together teaches us the skills we need to be successful in our 21st century global community.

In this class we work together, sometimes in small groups or in pairs. I ask that you respect each other. Please listen when someone speaks; do not interrupt; do not laugh at mistakes or make fun of someone's questions or ideas. The only way that we learn is by making mistakes, examining them, and then building on those to learn and fix those errors next time. The more you support each other, the more you will learn for yourself and about yourself.

Student Conduct in Our Class

You must follow the SRJC standards of conduct. If you disrupt the classroom, you will be instructed to leave class for two classes and will be subject to further disciplinary action.

Since this is an English class, you must speak English at all times while in the classroom or in the Zoom classroom and Zoom breakout rooms because it is the best way to learn English. Speaking in another language may exclude another student from the conversation, which can be rude and hurtful.

Please plan to arrive on time, stay the full meeting and conduct yourself in a way that is respectful of other students and their desire to learn. Attend class only if you wish to learn and contribute to this class and your own educational goals.

- Use capital letters sparingly. THEY LOOK LIKE SHOUTING.
- Forward emails only with a writer's permission.
- Be considerate of others' feelings and use language carefully.
- Cite all quotations (Use "quotation" marks), references, and sources (otherwise, it is plagiarism).
- Use humor carefully. It is hard to "read" tone; sometimes humor can be misread as criticism or personal attack. Feel free to use emoticons like :) for a smiley face to let others know you are being humorous.
- Use complete sentences and your best English grammar to compose posts.
- Write in proper paragraphs. Review work before submitting it.
- Text speak, such as "ur" for "your" or "ru" for "are you" etc., is only acceptable when texting.
