Assignments

Quizzes, Critiques, & Discussions 10-20 pts. each

There will be online quizzes and activities based on the reading, lectures, and in-class activities. These will have multiple choice, true/false, and short answer questions or may be interactive (watching or reading something) and then completing an activity.

Final Exam 100 pts.

This will be a cumulative exam given at the end of class. Speech partners with the highest grade are exempt from the final.

Introduction 100 pts.

In this speech, you will introduce your speech partner to the class in 2-3 minutes. This will be recorded in class and critiqued online.

Informative 150 pts.

The goal of informative speaking is to teach or enhance and understanding of skill, concept, or theory.

Persuasive 150 pts.

Advocacy is an important part of public speaking. In this speech you will analyze a controversial issue and advocate for its solution.

Impromptu 100 pts.

For this speech, you will be given a quote or topic. You will have 5 minutes to prepare a 5-minute speech on that topic.

Capstone 200 pts.

In this speech, you present an idea that you have that you think the world would benefit from.

ePortfolio 100 pts.

You will design and present an ePortfolio that highlights the accomplishments of the semester.

Participation & Activities 200 pts.

Is based on working with your speech partner, contributing to class discussions, and participating in online activities.

Extra Credit Opportunities

1. You may participate in the intramural speech competition to opt out of the final.
2. You may analyze a speech either face-to-face or online from the list of approved speeches.
3. You and your speech partner may get out of the final by having the highest grades in the class.
4. Attend an approved SRJC speaking event and write a response paper.

The following activities are a combination individual & group activities designed to help understand the speech writing and performance process and meeting the course outcomes. Additional details and rubrics are posted in Canvas.

Policies and Practices

Absences
