Benvenuti! Welcome to Second Term Italian (ITAL 2)!

Course description: This course is designed for beginners who already have some basic knowledge of Italian. Its goal is to give students the opportunity to review and expand their oral/aural and reading/writing proficiency in Italian. During the semester you will continue to learn grammar, vocabulary, pronunciation, while improving and expanding upon your basic interpersonal communicative skills, your ability to read and write in Italian, and your knowledge of Italian culture. To achieve these goals, you will be presented with a wide range of communication patterns and real-life situations.

Learning outcomes: At the end of the semester you will be able to use Italian to talk about yourself, your life, your friends, your favorite Italian foods, your likes and dislikes. You will also be able to speak in Italian about present and past events. You will be able to understand more complex conversations and clips from mainstream Italian films, and to write longer compositions.

Course requirements

Frequenza (Attendance)

You must be exposed to Italian and use Italian in order to learn it. Therefore, you must attend class regularly. In case of serious illness or injury, you must contact the Dean of Students Office so that they will inform all your professors that you will be missing classes. In case of absence for any other reason, you must notify me in advance. You are responsible for any work missed, so be sure to get the email addresses of a couple of your classmates so that you can find out what was covered in class.

Partecipazione e preparazione (Participation and preparation)

Regular active class participation is a vital element of your success in learning Italian. Throughout the semester you will be graded on your effort to always use Italian in class, your daily preparation for class, your contribution to a cooperative classroom atmosphere, and the quality and quantity of your participation in class and group activities. Please be aware that coming regularly to class and answering when called upon will not guarantee you a grade of 100% for participation; you will also be graded on qualities such as motivation, attitude, curiosity, and preparation. Preparation means that you have read the assigned pages and done the homework prior to class, as outlined in the Programma di lavoro.

Compiti (Homework)

Language acquisition requires a steady, constant and daily exposure to the target language. It is expected that you arrive in class having already completed the assignments indicated on the Programma di lavoro and/or on Canvas for that particular day.

This includes memorizing new vocabulary and studying new grammar points assigned in the readings. Late homework will not be accepted. Most of the MindTap homework exercises are computer-corrected, while others may require instructor correction. In addition to the MindTap exercises to be done online, there will also be additional exercises such as written and reading exercises, and group work to be completed outside of class.

Composizioni

You will write several compositions in Italian throughout the semester. On some occasions you may be given the opportunity to resubmit a rewrite after receiving my comments. The final grade you receive will be the average of the two grades.

The use of online dictionaries, such as WordReference, is permitted and encouraged; however, online translators are NOT allowed. If it is apparent that you've used an online translator for any written assignment, you will receive a 0 for the assignment without the possibility of resubmitting it.

Orali (Oral presentations and recordings)

You will have opportunities to work on your pronunciation and perfect your speaking skills in Italian through in-class presentations and MindTap voice recordings. Presentations will include both individual and paired work. Some will be of a more formal nature, such as giving a presentation on an aspect of Italian culture, while others will be role-plays, skits, interviews or reciting lyrics to popular songs.

Quiz (Quizzes)

There will be 5 periodic short quizzes over the course of the semester, testing your knowledge of the material studied up to that point. There are no make-up quizzes. The lowest grade will be dropped at the end of the semester. If you are absent on the day of the quiz, it will automatically count as your dropped score.

The midterm is a comprehensive exam covering the material up to the midway point of the semester. No make-up exam is possible except in case of serious and documented illness.

Esame finale (Final exam)

The final exam will be comprehensive of the entire semester and will take place during the period reserved for the Foreign
