- This course introduces the fundamentals of the discipline of art history with a focus on how to view and appreciate art in an increasingly diverse world. A methodological introduction will be followed with a global survey of art from a variety of media from the 16th century through contemporary times that highlights world-wide artistic trends and achievements. We will consider the historical, cultural, religious, and political contexts of a work of art as well as its production and reception.

Assignments and Grading Overview

Discussions: We will have a new discussion every other week (odd numbered weeks). Note that Part 3: follow-ups are due Sunday of the second week of the discussion--mark your calendar! They don't have a separate due date in the course calendar. (20 points x 7 discussions, 140 points possible).

Quizzes: Every other week (even numbered weeks), your quizzes will be due by Sunday. (20 points x 7 quizzes, 140 points possible).

Short writings: Some weeks also have a short written assignment or a step toward the Final Essay: these are also due by Sunday.
