Course Philosophy: This is an introduction to oral & written communication in Spanish. We will be speaking in Spanish from the very first class. Our goal is to communicate with a native speaker on an elementary level by the end of the course. To facilitate this, we will spend class time on oral communication, and the students will prepare by studying the text, doing the workbook and lab exercises, and other homework assignments. You will be amazed at how much progress you will make in such a short time. ¡Así que vamos a hablar en Español!

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students will be able to:

- Control in a more or less active fashion the simple present, present progressive and preterit tenses, including high-frequency irregular verbs, subject and object pronouns, and adjectives.
- 2. Initiate and maintain simple conversations in Spanish on everyday topics, formulating statements and questions in the present with beginning familiarity with the past.
- 3. Listen and comprehend short messages and general ideas expressed in spoken Spanish.
- 4. Pronounce intelligibly whatever you are able to say.
- 5. Write paragraph-length texts containing coherent descriptions of people, places, and everyday activities.
- Produce such vocabulary as greetings, school-related items, family members, clothes, food, days, months, weather, clock times, numbers, colors, cognates and common verbs.
- Read and comprehend the main ideas presented in simply written Spanish texts and magazine articles.
- Gain cultural information and insights about the Spanish-speaking world as well as the distinctive assets and contributions of Spanish-speaking communities in the United States.
- 9. Derive enjoyment from experiencing the different outlooks and unique attitudes that are embedded in another language and culture.

Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- Formulate short sentences and questions orally and interpret responses of other speakers using common Spanish vocabulary related to the most common everyday topics, such as family, travel, work and home.
- 2. Evaluate simplified passages on a range of cultural topics and correctly interpret and summarize content from authentic Spanish texts.
- 3. Compose short comprehensible sentences and phrases with a communicative purpose, displaying minimum surface-level errors such as spelling and accentuation.
- 4. Develop and organize information in Spanish into short sentences and paragraphs.
- 5. Generate questions and phrases that are comprehensible to a native speaker of Spanish.
- 6. Construct comprehensible sentences and distinguish accurately between subject and object pronouns, present tense of -ar, -ir, and -er verbs and the verbs ser, estar, tener, venir, stem-changing verbs, negation, articles, yes-no basic information questions, adjectives, and regular preterite verbs.
- 7. Employ greetings and polite expressions in culturally appropriate manner.
- 8. Describe the diverse social, cultural and historical aspects of the Spanish speaking world and Spanish speaking communities in the U.S.

NOTE: There is no lab requirement for this class, but there are activities to be completed online using Canvas.

- 2. Canvas Online Activities: Plan to dedicate two hours a week to complete the online activities in Canvas. The homework will be graded as follows: Chapter 1 = 20 pts. Chapters 2 8 = 40 pts. each chapter. Please make sure to complete ALL the assignments in each chapter to receive full credit. Absolutely no late homework will be accepted. - 3. **Workbook activities:** There will be daily activities that you will be expected to complete before coming to the next class. It is important to complete workbook activities on time in order to participate fully in class and to stay on top of your work.
- 4. **Testing:** All tests will be announced well in advance. There will be a test at the end of the following chapters: Chapter1&2 (E #1), chapter 3 (E # 2), chapter 4 (E # 3), chapters 5 &6 (E # 4), 7 (E # 5): for a total of 5 chapter Exams. The final exam will cover information in all chapters (1-8). Some of the exams may have an online portion that you will need to complete before coming to class the day the exam is due. Then there will be an in class part of the exam to be completed on the day of the exam.
- 3. **Participation:** Since this is a language class, the emphasis for this class will be on verbal and non-verbal, and written communication. Therefore, you will be participating in a variety of ways and in different formats. Sometimes you will work with a partner, sometimes in a small group, and sometimes by yourself. Please note that after missing two classes, each absence will lower your grade for attendance 10 points and participation 10 points.
- 4. Attendance: Because this is a language course, which relies heavily on oral communication, attendance is mandatory. After 2 absences, please be aware that each absence will lower your grade by 20 points. 2 tardies equals 1 absence, same thing if you leave 2 times after the break. A student may be dropped from the class with 4 absences. If for some reason, you are unable to attend class, it is your responsibility to get the homework from a classmate.
 - Attendance is mandatory. In a semester length course the instructor will follow the following SRJC attendance policy 8.1.5:
 - 1.1Students are expected to attend all sessions of the course in which they are enrolled.
 - 1.2 Any student with excessive absences may be dropped from the class.
 - 2.0 Excessive Absence Defined
 - 2.1 A student may be dropped from any class when that student's absences exceed ten percent (10%) of the total hours of class time. (4 classes)
 - 2.2 Instructors shall state in each course syllabus what constitutes excessive absence for that course.
 - 3.0 Excused vs. Unexcused absences
 - 3.1 Unless state or federal law requires that the absence be deemed excused, no instructor shall be required to make a distinction between excused and unexcused absences.
 - 3.2 If individual Instructors wish to distinguish between excused and unexcused absences the instructor shall state in each course syllabus all criteria for any excused absences in addition to those required by state or federal law.

Important note: Letting the professor know you will be absent does not mean it will be an excused absence.

5. **Make-up exams:** Students can do the following just once. If you are absent on the day of the exam, you may take it at the beginning of the next class period, or make

- arrangements with your professor. If the test includes a listening section, you won't be able to retake it, so will lose some points. Once exams have been returned to students, a make-up for that exam is not permitted.
- 6. **Final Exam:** Cumulative exam covering structures, vocabulary, writing, and reading comprehension
- 7. Homework: Absolutely no late homework will be accepted. You will be completing online activities using CANVAS and any activities from your textbook assigned by your professor. If, for some reason you are unable to attend class, it is your responsibility to get the homework from a classmate or review your syllabus to study the topic for that day.
- 8. **One Group Presentation:** Each student is required to do one 5 minute oral presentation. This presentation is worth 100 points. The topic must be approved by the instructor by the designated date in the syllabus. The presentation must include vocabulary from the chapter of your choice and you will need to use the grammatical topics covered in that chapter. Your presentation will be graded as follows:

- 9. A Spanish Class is a participatory event. In order to get the maximum benefit, you must be present, awake, paying attention and joining in the class activities. This means speaking Spanish, participating in groups and individual activities, listening to your professor and other students. If this occurs the professor will politely remind the student of these rules in person and by email. A second offense will require a conference with the Dean to get the official suspension time. If this behavior persists the professor will drop the student from the class.
