COURSE DESCRIPTION

Art 7B pursues in greater depth the concepts addressed in Art 7A with an emphasis on the development of individual themes and ideas. Students will be encouraged to use a variety of drawing materials and methods of use. (This course is accepted for transfer at both the UC and CSU systems.)

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The primary goal of this course is to improve visual awareness and strengthen the student's skills of problem solving. Second, it is the intent of this course to expand the student's understanding and definition of drawing and artmaking in general. Lastly, students will exercise the skills necessary to develop personal themes derived from their imagined as well as observed experiences. Students are encouraged to explore art resources (museums and galleries, libraries and the web) on and off campus as much as possible. Part of your studies should include viewing the art of others.

- **Class Participation** This includes attending class, having materials, paying attention to slide lectures and demonstrations, completing assignments in a timely manner, following directions, classroom clean-up and verbal participation in critiques and class discussions. Participation counts for roughly 20% of your final grade.
- Work Ethic Success and completion of assignments requires motivation and total focus. Students **MUST** keep an open mind and be accepting to all art making experiences.
- Attendance Students are expected to be punctual and remain for the entire class period. Excessive absences, arriving late or leaving early will have a negative effect on final grades. Four or more absences may result in the lowering of at least one letter grade. Eight absences may result in you being dropped. Three lates/ leaving early equals one absence. NOTE: If you are sick or exhibiting any of the symptoms related to Covid-19, do not come to class and get yourself tested before returning. You will not be penalized for absences due to Covid if you provide proof of a positive test or a doctor's note.

- **Portfolio** Students are responsible for making up missed work regardless of whether an absence is excused or not. Students will store and maintain all class work. Wrinkled, folded and/or damaged work is unacceptable. Selected work will be submitted on Canvas as a digital portfolio prior to the last week of class. Late portfolios will be lowered one letter grade. *Note: Toxic spray fix must be used away from all buildings.*
- Homework SRJC policy for homework is 2 hours per every hour of lecture. That's about 4 hours a week for this class. In general, you will have less. In order to receive an "A" grade, students must complete all homework assignments as well as unfinished classwork outside of class. However, completion of this work does not guarantee an "A". Drawings must be above average (solid "B") to receive credit. Follow the directions and number each assignment. Homework will be "reviewed" throughout the semester. The first homework assignment is the "The List". In addition, some projects will require research completed outside of class. This includes, but is not limited to, sketches and preparatory drawings as well as various forms of reference materials. Failure to prepare for projects will hinder one's ability to meet the objectives of any given project in a timely manner.
- Sketchbook Students will maintain a journal of ideas and technical notes relevant to this class. Think of your sketchbook as a "How to Draw" book.
 Sketchbook should be with you at all times. Note: Try to get into the habit of drawing daily in your sketchbook.

Class Conduct SRJC is committed to cultivating an environment of antiracism and cultural competency. This classroom is a space for ideas and exploration. Although discriminatory language or behavior of any kind will not be tolerated, everyone is welcome and encouraged to participate and share their perspective. It is imperative that we listen to one another and respectfully acknowledge diverse views with curiosity and kindness.

EVALUATION OF CLASS WORK

Class work will be evaluated on a point system. Not all projects address the same objectives therefore the criteria for each project will vary. Typically, we will discuss and critique a project at which time students will have an opportunity to make improvements before submitting a project for final evaluation. Work that is incomplete at the time of critique or submitted late may be lowered one letter grade (approximately two points).

Criteria for evaluation may include but not limited to the following:

- 1. **Presentation** (Craft and handling of materials)
- 2. Objectives (follows directions, addresses challenges of the project)
- 3. Principles of Design (compositional balance, unity, etc.)
- 4. Use of Art Elements (Line quality, Value, Color, etc.)
- 5. **Image Dynamics, a.k.a.** "The Wow Factor" (Use of "**all of the above**" to create a strong visual and psychological impact.) *Note: Not all work has this. Consider your favorite musician. You may like all of their songs yet some touch you in a more deep and intensive way than others.

DOCUMENTATION AND SUBMITION OF CLASS WORK

Final portfolio will be submitted Canvas as a **JPEG file**. It is imperative that you take exceptional pictures of your artwork. The evaluation of your work will be based on the quality of your photographic representation. Below are some guidelines:

- 1. **Orientation**: Make sure that the image shows top edge "up." If your image is sideways your composition may be off balance.
- 2. **Lighting**: Generally natural light is best (outdoors). Situations where light is evenly dispersed is best (e.g., overcast days or light from left and right sides of artwork). A single light source from one side will create a gradation of light. Avoid dark or bright areas that will "wash-out" an image or make it difficult to see (e.g., a dark closet or direct artificial light or sunlight). Don't use a flash.
- 3. **Shadows**: Avoid shadows from yourself or other objects to cross your image.
- 4. **Glare**: Avoid "hot-spots" in your image where direct light is creating a white spot or bright area.
- 5. Cropping: Keep your work flat and crop to the image or paper when required. No carpet, tabletops, beds, toes, etc. in the image.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop and apply intermediate level drawing and composition concepts.
- 2. Make critical choices about their own work and verbalize a description of this to others.
- 3. Practice drawing dynamics to create aesthetic value and develop a more advanced understanding of pictorial space using a variety of drawing materials and assemble a portfolio of personal work.

FINAL EVALUATION

The majority of your grade is determined by your in-class performance and the skills you acquire from attending this course. Although grading is specific to the achievements of each individual, students are expected to have a greater understanding, appropriate for this class level, of the basic concepts. Above average grades require an advanced level of achievement and commitment to the work inside and outside of class. Letter grades will be based on

conceptual comprehension, adherence to course requirements, originality, craftsmanship and the evidence of growth.

A= Excellent Work No more than 3 absences. Total participation and commitment to course requirements while meeting the objectives of each project inside and outside of class. Completion of all in-class and homework assignments with an above average grade, meeting attendance requirements, respect for your work and the work of others, and exhibiting willingness to take chances and grow.

B= Strong Work Completion of all in-class work. Above average participation and commitment to course requirements and meeting the objectives of each project, and respect for your work and the work of others.

C= Average Work (Meeting minimum requirements of the course) and/or Lack of motivation, not meeting objectives of the projects, unprepared/not having materials, disruptive behavior, unfinished work and poor attendance.

D or F = Incomplete work, poor work ethic, and/or failure to appear

P= Meeting minimum requirements of the course (this includes submission of a portfolio at midterm and final evaluations.)

Note: Although grades for portfolios and/or work may contain (+) or (-), only whole letter grades will be used for determining final grades.
