# FIRE74: Fire Protection Equipment and Systems: Section 3691, Fall 2023 Course Syllabus

Fire Protection Equipment and Systems Syllabus is optional for your use. Available for review is the Fire 74 course outline of record.

## **Course Description**

Fire 74 is a 3-unit core Fire Technology course that provides fundamental information on portable fire extinguishing equipment; water systems, protection systems for special hazards; automatic fire sprinkler systems, standpipes and hose systems, fire detection equipment, signaling equipment, and smoke management systems.

The best way to move through the class is to use the modules and select next at the bottom of the page so that you do not miss any content. Quizzes are required for 14 Units to assess your knowledge of the subject. There will be no quiz for Units 15 or 16. This time should be spent on your final "Historical Street Block Fire Protection" Adobe Express presentation. This peer reviewed presentation will be seen as your final exam as well as graded by the instructor.



# **Late Policy**

Submissions more than one week late will not be accepted without prior arrangement. There will be modules that allow you to go back and submit past due assignments for partial grades. Look for Extra Credit discussions in the modules to make up for missed points.

## **Quizzes and Assessments**

There are 14 online quizzes. The midterm is not your typical exam assessment. The midterm will be a student reflection of the materials covered in the text and online materials. Group projects will be assigned during the class. The final exam will incorporate information from the texts and lessons in the Adobe Express presentation. The material for the quizzes comes from the textbook and lessons. If any quiz or assessment is missed, a zero will be recorded as the score. It is your responsibility to take the quizzes by the due date. The "Historical Street Block Fire Protection" Adobe Express presentation submittal will be due the week prior to the final Module and the peer review will be the last discussion assignment to complete the class. Because of your busy lives, two of the lowest quiz scores will be dropped from the final score.

## **Adobe "Express"** Presentation

Students ARE REQUIRED to complete "Historical Street Block Fire Protection" Adobe Express presentation as the final exam. It will consist of a minimum of 15 pictures, but no more than 20. (Students who choose not to submit a presentation will receive an F for the course.) The presentation will be on a topic from a list provided on the assignment page or as approved by the instructor. The presentation **must** include the works cited within the presentation. This assignment will be broken into three mandatory submittals. The final submittal will be the full presentation. The presentation must be submitted through Canvas (Assignment Link). Grades for late presentations will not be accepted unless arrangements are made prior to the deadline. The due date is provided on the Unit Content Table. See the Rubric for the Presentation on the assignment page. All three submittals are REQUIRED MANDATORY assignments. Students who do not complete the assignments FAIL the course.

Start looking in your local area of a historical street block that you would like to do a presentation. This will be the visible fire protection systems that are installed on that street block. Data and pictures, with permission if inside, will be collected from public areas and during opening hours. Students will provide a history of the area and show where fire protection systems have been added. They will try to complete a very basic assessment of if a fire were to start in one of the buildings and how much of the historical area they could lose because of the lack of protection or could be saved because of the fire protection systems installed.

Contact the instructor if you are a visually disabled student and need an alternative assignment.

#### **Online Discussion Attendance**

Networking is extremely important for firefighters and fire service professionals at all levels. More than likely, each of you will only know each other by email addresses or ZOOM Meetings. So as the instructor, I made a Student Lounge Discussion area where you can talk with each other. We will have some seasoned firefighters and fire professionals in the class, so it is a great place to network and ask questions. I will not be monitoring this discussion area. So be professional and polite. That person may turn out to be your Captain someday. A second Q&A Discussion Board called "Fire House Kitchen Table" is available for student interaction with each other and will not be monitored, but if you can answer the questions among each other, that would be the best outcome. Since participation in online classes is important, we are going to have a group discussion every Unit. It is so important it is worth 20 points. There are posted questions to start the discussion, but you can comment on what you perceived or thought. Make sure you explain in detail your observation. Feedback is important so make sure to comment back to another student to receive the full 20 points.

## **DIRECTIONS for Discussion Success:**

Discussions will be shared throughout the class. You must take part in the discussion the week of the discussion according to the Unit dates for full credit. Students must supply a first post by Tuesday at 11:59 PM, provide a minimum of one comment to other student's posts by Thursday at 11:59 PM. Both the first post and additional posts must be at least 100 words or more. Your first post will be worth 15 points and your answer back will be worth 5 points.

I leave all discussions open during the class for students who wish to continue the dialogue, however the discussions are graded shortly after the week they are due according to the calendar of events.

There may be discussions that I ask for you to use FLIP or be used for extra credit. The requirements for these discussions will clearly be spelled out on that Unit's Discussion Page. Follow the Rubric for full points.
