This course is a study of practical reasoning, argumentation, and the analysis of language as useful tools for making reasonable decisions about what to do and believe.

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GRADING & ASSIGNMENTS

The student will, by doing the assigned work for the course, accumulate points which will determine the final grade.

As this is a 3 unit, UC transferrable course, the student is expected to do 6 hours of homework every week (about 2 hours outside class for every one hour inside class is the legal definition of a unit in a lecture class)

There will be 5 ways I assess learning in the course. They are as follows:

Exercises - Homework - This is work done at home grinding to get good. Translation: practice so you will know what you are doing. There may be additional points to be earned for explaining your answers, depending on the assignment. If you are struggling with a particular exercise, when I grade it, I may assign a review exercise which will be treated as extra credit. Exercises have varying numbers of problems, +1 XP per problem completed.

Quizzes - You will take online quizzes in this class via Canvas. 10 - 20 XP per quiz.

Roleplay Activities - There will be fantasy role-playing in this class to solve mysteries and other Scooby-Doo type shit. It will be fun. It is a way to earn extra points for being a human with functioning imagination and critical thinking skills. This is a learning activity that is meant to reward participation and engagement of the activity. Our TA will be explaining this and he is primarily responsible for this aspect of the course. This is typically conducted via the discussion board. **+10-25 XP** per assignment

Tests - You will take online tests in this class via Canvas. 25-50 XP per test.

Extra Credit - Some of these help you gain further practice in particular units if you need it. These are called Review Exercises. Others may be online, event-based. These are at my discretion. **+? XP per assignment**

*Important Note About Grades!: The Canvas gradebook has a default setting of showing students their grades and treating all ungraded work as having no effect upon their grade in the course. This is a huge problem because it means that if you are missing work and I have not entered a 0 grade for that missed work, it will appear as though this does not effect your final grade. This is inaccurate. In order to turn this off and force the gradebook to treat all ungraded work as though it has earned a 0 grade (which is going to be more accurate although you must still sometimes be patient while I get caught up on grading), students must individually access the gradebook here in our Canvas class and uncheck the box that has the description, "Calculate based only on graded assignments."

ACADEMIC FREEDOM & INTEGRITY

Teaching philosophy is an enterprise fraught with danger. I may use examples or discuss views that are flawed from the point of view of critical thinking. This does not necessarily mean the content of the idea is bad, although sometimes it is. It does mean that the reasoning used to get from one idea to the next was flawed in a way that leaves it vulnerable to critique. In general, we operate in this class as though no idea is above potential examination and critique. This is the only way to be intellectually honest and fair. Please keep in mind that just because we believe something strongly that our belief makes it true or if lots of people believe it we should accept it without examination. We should prepare to learn and examine ideas with the following working principles so we can all get the most out of our class:

1. Academic Freedom. No opinion is taboo. No one in my class will ever be silenced on the basis of the content of an opinion they express. Grades will never be based on the content of one's opinion. Academic freedom is a core value; education (as opposed to indoctrination) cannot really happen without it. This applies equally to instructor and student. That does not mean that opinions will not be subject to criticism.

Additionally, it does not mean that you should expect an opinion to be treated as a well-supported argument or as truth. They will not be. You should be prepared to defend your ideas with reason and evidence.

- 1. **Respect for Diversity of Perspective**. While one may express any opinion in terms of its content; that freedom does not absolutely apply to the WAY something is said nor does it imply that you should expect to be free from the consequences of expressing an opinion. I will not protect anyone from the consequences of espousing an offensive opinion. Indeed, one cannot simultaneously protect freedom of speech and freedom from offence. However, I will insist that opinions are expressed with respect for persons. You may argue against someone's beliefs in class, but you may not ridicule them or put them down as a person or judge them based on their membership in a particular group or classification, real or imagined.
- 1. Academic rigor. The basis of the class is that we engage in the critical thinking we are learning. This is a class that will challenge you to apply what you are learning. Because of the analytical nature of the class, cherished beliefs might feel threatened regardless of the respectful intentions of the speaker. While no one will be silenced, or graded down because they express a particular opinion, everyone will be held accountable to give real evidence and valid arguments for their opinions. By argument I mean a series of reasons given to support a particular conclusion (belief). An argument is invalid if the reasons don't actually support the conclusion. I'll say more about this in class. By critical I mean the position that a claim, a belief, to be worthy of being accepted, must be made of good reasons and is subject to be judged as true/false, better/worse on the basis of the quality of the reasons given.
- Academic Integrity for Instructors. It is my responsibility to engage the practices of critical thinking information fairly and objective. The student is urged to keep in mind from the get-go that critical thinking is not easy but that the instructor holds themselves to very high standards for the quality of what I am teaching you to do.
- 3. Academic Integrity for Students. It is your responsibility to do your own homework, writing, and quizzes. All work for the course should be your own intellectual effort. Cheating of any kind will not be tolerated. Copying another student's work or committing plagiarism will result in automatic zero for the assignment (first offense). Repeat offenders are subject to automatic F for the course or even expulsion.

Collaborating on or copying of tests or homework in whole or in part, without explicit permission from the instructor, will be considered an act of academic dishonesty and result in a grade of 0 for that test or assignment.
