# **Course Description**

Fire 73 is a 3-unit core fire technology course that provides the fundamental information regarding the history and philosophy of fire prevention, organization and operation of a fire prevention bureau, use of fire codes, identification and correction of fire hazards, and the relationship of fire prevention to fire safety education and detection and suppression systems. The best way to move through the class is to use the modules and select next at the bottom of the page so that you do not miss any content. Quizzes are required for 14 Units to assess your knowledge of the subject. There will be no quiz for Units 15 or 16. This time should be spent on your final "History in Fire Prevention" Adobe Express presentation. This peer reviewed presentation will be seen as your final exam.

- 2. Discuss the need, responsibilities, and importance of fire prevention organizations.



# **Late Policy**

All assignments, discussions and quizzes are due in Canvas at 11:59 PM [Pacific Standard Time] on the due date. A late submission will receive a 10% grade reduction per day up to 5 days. Any assignment not completed will receive a zero. Submissions more than one week late are not accepted without prior arrangement. There will be modules that allow you to go back and submit past due assignments for partial grades. The mandatory assignments as part of your final Adobe Express presentation are required to pass the class. Look for Extra Credit discussions in the modules to make up missed points.

## **Quizzes and Assessments**

There are 14 online quizzes. The midterm is not your typical exam assessment. The midterm will incorporate the lessons from the earlier modules in the script and citation submission of the Adobe Express presentation. The final exam will incorporate information from the texts and lessons in the Adobe Express presentation. The material for the quizzes comes from the textbook and lessons. If any quiz or assessment is missed, a zero will be recorded as the score. It is your responsibility to take the quizzes by the due date. The "History in Fire Prevention" Adobe Express presentation submittal will be due the week prior to the final Module and the peer review will be the last discussion assignment to complete the class. Because of your busy lives, two of the lowest quiz scores will be dropped from the final score.

# **Adobe "Express"** Presentation

Students ARE REQUIRED to complete "History in Fire Prevention" Adobe Express presentation as the final exam. You will get to choose from the list below for your project. It will consist of a minimum of 15 pictures, but no more than 20. (Students who choose not to submit a presentation

will receive an F for the course.) The presentation will be on a topic from a list provided on the assignment page or as approved by the instructor. The presentation **must** include the works cited within the presentation. This assignment will be broken into three mandatory submittals. The final submittal will be the full presentation. The presentation must be submitted through Canvas (Assignment Link). Grades for late presentations will not be accepted unless arrangements are made prior to the deadline. The due date is provided on the Unit Content Table. See the Rubric for the Presentation on the assignment page. All three submittals are REQUIRED MANDATORY assignments. Students who do not complete the assignments FAIL the course.

The LNU Complex Fires, (Tubbs, Nuns, Atlas, Pocket), Ghost Ship, Kincade, Glass fires are not included on the list since we will be talking about these in class.

#### **Online Discussion Attendance**

Networking is extremely important for firefighters and fire service professionals at all levels. More than likely, each of you will only know each other by email addresses or ZOOM Meetings. So as the instructor, I made a Student Lounge Discussion area where you can talk with each other. We will have some seasoned firefighters and fire professionals in the class, so it is a great place to network and ask questions. I will not be monitoring this discussion area. So be professional and polite. That person may turn out to be your Captain someday. Since participation in online classes is important, we are going to have a group discussion every Unit. It is so important it is worth 20 points. There are posted questions to start the discussion, but you can comment on what you perceived or thought. Make sure you explain in detail your observation. Feedback is important so make sure to comment back to another student to receive the full 20 points.

# **DIRECTIONS for Discussion Success:**

Discussions will be shared throughout the class. You must take part in the discussion the week of the discussion according to the Unit dates for full credit. Students must supply a first post by Tuesday at 11:59 PM, provide a minimum of one comment to other student's posts by Thursday at 11:59 PM. Both the first post and additional posts must be at least 100 words or more. Your first post will be worth 15 points and your answer back will be worth 5 points. Discussions and Assignments may be assigned using Voice Thread (VT), Studio, PlayPosit, Hypothesis, or other applications to promote class involvement. The requirements for these discussions will clearly be spelled out on that Unit's Discussion or Assignment Page.

I leave all discussions open during the class for students who wish to continue the dialogue, however the discussions are graded shortly after the week they are due according to the calendar of events.

There may be discussions that I ask for you to use FLIP or be used for extra credit. Follow the Rubric for full points.

# **Grading Policy**
