FIRE74: Fire Protection Equipment and Systems: Section 7719, Spring 2025 Course Syllabus

Fire Protection Equipment and Systems Syllabus is optional for your use. Available for review is the <u>Fire</u> 74 course outline of record.

Course Description

Fire 74 is a 3-unit core Fire Technology course that provides fundamental information on portable fire extinguishing equipment; water systems, protection systems for special hazards; automatic fire sprinkler systems, standpipes and hose systems, fire detection equipment, signaling equipment, and smoke management systems.

The best way to move through the class is to use the modules and select next at the bottom of the page so that you do not miss any content. Quizzes are required for 14 Units to assess your knowledge of the subject. There will be no quiz for Units 15 or 16. This time should be spent on your final "Historical Street Block Fire Protection" Adobe Express presentation. This peer reviewed presentation will be seen as your final exam as well as graded by the instructor.

- Describe the different types of water-based fire protection systems and their operating principles.

Dropping the Class

Attendance

Attendance is not optional for this course. If students accrue nine hours (9) of absence, including missed assignments, quizzes, and modules, they may be dropped from the class.

The instructor will post announcements on the Announcements page in Canvas throughout the semester. Canvas notifies students according to their preferred Notification Preferences.

Late Policy

All assignments, discussions, and quizzes are due in Canvas at 11:59 PM [Pacific Standard Time] on the due date. Late submissions will receive a 10% daily grade reduction for up to 5 days. Any assignment not completed will receive a zero. As you know, submissions that are more than one week late are not accepted without prior arrangements. Some modules allow you to return and submit past-due assignments for partial grades. The mandatory assignments for your final Adobe Express presentation are required to pass the class. Look for Extra Credit discussions in the modules to make up missed points.

Quizzes and Assessments

There are 14 online quizzes. The midterm is not your typical exam assessment. The midterm will be a student reflection on the materials covered in the text and online materials. The final assessment will incorporate information from the texts and lessons in the Adobe Express presentation of a historical street block fire protection system from the student's City of choice. The material for the quizzes comes from the textbook and lessons. If a quiz or assessment is missed, the score will be recorded as a zero. It is the student's responsibility to take the quizzes by the due date. The "Historical Street Block Fire Protection" Adobe Express presentation submittal will be due the week before the final Module, and the peer review will be the last discussion assignment to complete the class. Because of your busy lives, two of the lowest quiz scores will removed from the final score.

Adobe "ExpressLinks to an external site." Presentation

Students ARE REQUIRED to complete the "Historical Street Block Fire Protection" Adobe Express presentation as the final exam. It will consist of at least 15 pictures but no more than 20. (Students who choose not to submit a presentation will receive an F for the course.) The presentation will be on a topic from a list provided on the assignment page or with the instructor's approval. The presentation **must** include the works cited within the presentation. This assignment will be broken into three mandatory submittals. The final submittal will be the full presentation. The presentation must be submitted through Canvas (Assignment Link). Grades for late presentations will not be accepted unless arrangements are made prior to the deadline. The due date is provided on the Unit Content Table. See the Rubric for the Presentation on the assignment page. All three submittals are REQUIRED MANDATORY assignments. Students who do not complete the assignments FAIL the course.

Start looking in your local area of a historical street block that you would like to do a presentation on. The presentation will include visible fire protection systems that are installed on that street block. Data and pictures, with permission if inside, will be collected from public areas and during opening hours. Students will provide a history of the area and show where fire protection systems have been added. Students will try to complete a very basic assessment if a fire were to start in one of the buildings and how much of the historical area they could lose because of the lack of protection or could be saved because of the active and passive fire protection systems installed.

Contact the instructor if you are a visually disabled student and need an alternative assignment.

Online Discussion Attendance

Networking is extremely important for firefighters and fire service professionals at all levels. More than likely, each of you will only know each other by email addresses or introductory videos. So as the instructor, I added a Q&A Discussion Board called "Fire House Kitchen Table". It is available for student interaction with each other and will not be monitored so that you can ask and answer questions amongst each other. We will have some seasoned firefighters and fire professionals in the class, so it is a great place to network and ask questions of each other. Since I will not monitor the Fire House Kitchen Table, please be professional and polite. Since participation in online classes is important, we will have a group discussion in every module using different tools. Discussions are so important that they are worth 20 points. There are posted questions to start the discussion, but you can comment on what you perceived or thought. Make sure you explain in detail your observation. Feedback is important, so comment back to another student to receive the full 20 points.

Directions for Discussion Success:

Discussions will be shared throughout the class. You must participate the discussion the week of the discussion according to the module dates for full credit. Students must supply a first post by Tuesday at 11:59 PM and provide at least one comment to other students' posts by Thursday at 11:59 PM. The first and additional posts must be at least 100 words or more. Your first post will be worth 15 points, and your comment on a student's post will be worth 5 points.

I leave all discussions open during class for students who wish to continue the dialogue. However, according to the calendar of events, the discussions are graded shortly after the week they are due.

Discussions and Assignments may be assigned using Voice Thread (VT), Canvas Studio, PlayPosit, or other applications to promote class involvement. The requirements for these discussions will be clearly spelled out on that Unit's Discussion Page. Follow the Rubric for full points.

Grading Policy

Click the "Grades" link in Canvas to keep track of your grades. I grade weekly (usually on Mondays) and post grades and comments in the Canvas grade book. Modules may include extra-credit assignments.
