COURSE CONTENT

Outcomes and Objectives:

At the end of the course the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify medical and dental precautions in patient treatment; determine proper precautionary procedures (including consultation & referral) and apply those procedures during treatment.
- 2. Apply current emergency procedures whenever necessary for the patient's well-being.
- 3. Apply current accepted principles of infection control.
- 4. Integrate and perform all aspects of dental hygiene care on a variety of patients at the SRJC dental hygiene clinic. Care will include assessment procedures, recording (charting) of findings, dental hygiene treatment planning, preventive procedures, therapeutic procedures, adjunct therapies and follow up care (including patient re-evaluation & maintenance).

Specifically the student will be able to:

- 5. Take and record patient medical, dental, and dental hygiene histories.
- 6. Perform and record findings from extra and intraoral examinations.
- 7. Conduct and perform accurate periodontal & restorative examinations.
- 8. Apply the intraoral camera technique for patient education
- 9. Interpret radiographs in recognizing normal and abnormal conditions of the oral cavity.
- 10. Request consultations for further medical or dental clarification when indicated.

- 11. Establish dental hygiene treatment/care plans through case studies
- 12. Assess patient's needs for pain control procedures, administer such procedures and identify and manage complications which may occur.
- 13. Perform appropriate preventive procedures on a variety of patients.
- 14. Determine, select and use the proper armamentarium used in oral prophylaxis procedures, initial periodontal preparation, and periodontal maintenance therapy on patients.
- 15. Demonstrate an ability to perform instrumentation procedures ultrasonic scaling devices.
- 16. Detect and remove plaque, calculus, and altered cementum from unattached tooth surfaces.
- 17. Perform the following skills: scaling and root planing gingival curettage, administration of local anesthesia, margination procedures, the placement of occlusal sealants, fluoride therapy, expose and interpret radiographs, finish and polish restorations.
- 18. Perform dental hygiene services for patients at extramural dental clinics.
- 19. Demonstrate a high level of professional and ethical conduct with patients, students, faculty and staff.
- 20. Demonstrate a high level of proficiency in the management of patient care.

Topics and Scope:

Daily clinical performance on patients at the SRJC dental hygiene clinic. Seminar topics:

- A. Restoration finishing and polishing
- B. Use of intraoral camera
- C. Advanced principles of periodontal exploring
- D. Periodontal Dressings
- E. Sutures (placement and removal)
- F. Ultrasonic scaling devices
- G. Computer technology in dentistry
- H. Case presentations
