COURSE CONTENT

Outcomes and Objectives:

- 1. Speak extemporaneously in Spanish in such contexts as: business, travel, and family life.
- 2. Utilize basic intermediate-level Spanish grammar and vocabulary needed to interact in everyday situations.
- 3. Identify the main ideas expressed in spoken Spanish by native speakers on topics related to society, current affairs and notable personalities.

Topics and Scope:

Content and topics will reflect intermediate communicative skills required to function in social, academic and career-related situations.

- 1. The language of common social relations.
- 2. Common modes of expression all arising from specific situations that might occur in business, leisure, shopping, the dinner table, travel, etc. a. making plans
 - b. negotiating problems
 - c. describing people, places, things and circumstances
 - d. expressing preferences
 - e. imagining and speculating
 - f. communicating feelings, questions, doubts
- 3. Narration of personal experience, witnessed events and news events.
- 4. Cultural phenomena of the Spanish-speaking world from historical events to arts and entertainment.
- 5. Narrative tenses, comparatives, pronouns, commands and overview of the subjunctive mood.

Assignment:

The following represent typical assignments for the Spanish 50C course:

1. Role-plays on very specific interpersonal situations.

- 2. Interviews to obtain information from Spanish speakers.
- 3. Weekly pair and small group discussions and problem-solving.
- 4. Weekly web-based exercises in listening comprehension, summarizing and interpreting authentic Spanish-language material.
- 5. Presentation of original speeches and skits.
- 6. Preparation for weekly vocabulary quizzes.
- 7. Written grammar and syntax exercises.
- 8. Final exam.

Methods of Evaluation/Basis of Grade:

Writing: Assessment tools that demonstrate writing skills and/or require students to select, organize and explain ideas in writing.

Written homework, Reading reports, Term papers, Written classroom and online participation

Problem Solving: Assessment tools, other than exams, that demonstrate competence in computational or non-computational problem solving skills.

Skill Demonstrations: All skill-based and physical demonstrations used for assessment purposes including skill performance exams.

Oral dialogues and situational skits. Oral reports and cultural presentations.

Exams: All forms of formal testing, other than skill performance exams.
