Assignment:

- 3. Preparation of vocal solos, if assigned.
- 4. Attendance and participation at sectional rehearsals when scheduled.
- 5. Organizing and leading sectional rehearsals, if assigned.
- 6. Participation in concerts, tours, and other field trips as scheduled.
- 7. Final exam will be a public concert.
