- 5. Organize and implement standard rehearsal protocol as a section or organizational leader.
- 6. Demonstrate professionalism through regular attendance at rehearsals and concerts, punctuality, preparedness, appropriate concert attire, and general demeanor.

Students repeating Concert Choir will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate greater technical achievement in their vocal performance.
- 2. Articulate musical phrases with greater clarity.
- 3. Perform with higher standards of intonation.
- 4. Demonstrate a more sophisticated comprehension of dynamics, phrasing, musical expression, and nuance.
- 5. Perform a more extensive repertoire.

Music rehearsal is a fully-integrated experience that encompasses both lecture and lab activities.
