3. Demonstrate ability to help with and/or delegate tasks associated with magazine and website production, such as copyediting, headline and cutline writing, photo editing, design, layout and magazine distribution.

4. Develop story ideas, conduct research and interviews, and write articles for three or more of the following sections: news, feature, opinion, sports or arts and entertainment.

5. Create two types of multimedia, social media or mobile journalism news or feature stories, using blend of audio, photos, video or text.

- 6. Edit stories for content, Associated Press (AP) Style, grammar and punctuation.
- 7. Demonstrate ability to upload stories and photos to website.
- 8. Demonstrate ability to design pages or make corrections using page design software.
- 9. Select articles, photographs and artwork for publication.
