- 1. Compose essays of 500 words in Italian on topics of general or societal interest.
- 2. Converse and speak extemporaneously on a wide range of topics.
- 3. Comprehend Italian spoken naturally on a wide range of common topics.
- 4. Comprehend the general meaning of short fiction and non-fiction written in Italian with the help of a dictionary.
- 5. Formulate sentences in Italian that include appropriate pronouns, prepositions and conjunctions as well as the correct usage of a broad range of regular and irregular verbs in all tenses and moods, including "se" expressions (periodo ipotetico).
- 6. Produce and employ with relative ease most regular and irregular verb conjugations.
- 7. Correctly use and place pronouns (subject, reflexive, direct, indirect object and disjunctive).
- 8. Comfortably produce and use most everyday Italian vocabulary words, common idioms, and some theme-specific vocabulary extracted from readings.
- 9. Correctly pronounce Italian words.
