- 1. Students will be able to list the essential elements or corpus delicti of each criminal statute studied during the course and identify the statute by the known numerical code section.
- 2. Students will be able to research and explain case law decisions interpreting selected criminal statutes studied during the course.
- 3. Given word-picture scenarios and other hypothetical situations in written form, students will be to identify whether or not a crime has occurred given the statutes covered in Learning Domain #6 (Property Crimes); #7 (Crimes Against Persons); #8 (General Criminal Statutes); #9 (Crimes Against Children); #10 (Sex Criimes); #39 (Crimes Against The Justice System); and #40 (Weapons Violations) of the Basic Law Enforcement Course Curriculum mandated by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (P.O.S.T.).
- 4. Given word-picture scenarios and other hypothetical situations in written form, students will be able to identify whether or not an arrest can be accomplished for violation of the law.

- 2. Given the title of the crime, identify the numerical statute code section for the crime, and visa versa.
- 3. Word-picture scenarios and other hypothetical situations in written form covering assigned past and current appellate decisions interpreting criminal statutes.
- 4. Completion of a workbook provided by the P.O.S.T. Commission on Learn-

ing Domains covered in the Basic Law Enforcement Course.

Methods of Evaluation/Basis of Grade:
